DUBLIN, Dec. 16.
LONDONDERRY MEETING.
A meeting of the associated Corps of the Militia and Liberties of Londonderry, on parade, on the 15th of December, 1783.
FRANCIS, Esq. Col. Commandant, presided unanimously. That the following resolution be presented to his Lordship by our commanding Officer, at the head of the Corps.
My Lord,
Your Lordship's return from the discharge of that important duty which the voice of the Volunteers of this City County appointed you to, we the Associates of Londonderry, think it incumbent on us to express, in the warmest terms, our grateful perfect approbation of your distinguished patriotic conduct.
Though, my Lord, venality and corruption for the present, denied the just and necessary restitution of the Rights of the People, we do not despair, but, relying on the justice of the cause, we are DETERMINED to persevere in seeking such a Parliamentary reform as will EFFECTUALLY destroy the influence of the aristocracy, and make the Representatives of the People.
In this great and necessary pursuit, we rely on the assistance of your Lordship, and of every friend to the Freedom, Peace, and Happiness of Ireland.

Which his Lordship was pleased to return the following Answer:
Palace, at Derry, Dec. 7, 1783.
I have not harboured a doubt, but that the conduct of your Delegate General, Discharged with a spirit equal to your confidence, would merit the approbation to which his interest was entitled, and your virtues were distinguished by order of the associated Corps, venality and corruption to which you

I have not yet disappointed your just expectations, but as we see that all men are fallible, may the moment of my transgression be the last of my existence.

BRISTOL.
Yesterday an express was sent to London with the three last Money Bills. If any delay whatever occurs in London, or contrary winds at their return precludes the arrival of the Packets, the additional duties will be expired, some days, before their re-emption.
By the last London entries it appears, there are vast quantities of Rum shipping for this market, on the presumption that it will arrive here before the 25th of this month, when the additional duty of 6d. per gallon takes place. Nothing but the present high price of malt which operates against our distilleries, can justify so hazardous a speculation.
The vessels now on their passage here from Bourdeaux, Rotterdam, and London with rum, brandy, and genera, have orders to put into the first harbour they can make in Ireland, for the purpose of saving the high duty which takes place on Christmas day.

The Undertakers of the great national work, the Grand Canal, are, we hear, determined, if the bill, for lending their Company 50,000l. in debentures, passes, to carry on their design with the greatest expedition and vigour, by employing as many hands thereon as the nature of it will permit. It is thought the number of men employed will be near 3000.
The New York Gazette contains a proclamation, forbidding all persons from making settlements on lands inhabited or claimed by Indians, without the limits or jurisdiction of any particular State; and from purchasing or receiving a gift or cession of such lands or claims, without the express authority and directions of the United States in Congress assembled, and it moreover declares, that every such purchase, settlement, gift or cession, not having the authority aforesaid, shall be null and void; and that no right or title will accrue in consequence of any such purchase, gift, cession, or settlement.

Notwithstanding the utmost exertions of the Ministry in both countries, for three months past, to take care of Ireland, we can assure the public that the whole number of regular forces therein does not exceed 12,500 men, including those just landed, by accident, at Waterford from America.
When the whole of our Forces shall have put into Waterford, Cork, or Kinsale, by contrary winds, on their passage from America to England, there will be then about 30,000 regulars in the kingdom; so that, in all human probability, the plan of operations already laid down by Lord North, Mr. Fox, and their worthy coadjutors for this country, will ripen into effect before the wind may again prove favourable for those troops to complete their passage to England.
