He read to the House the words which it was reported had been used by the King to Lord Temple, from a written paper, and they were nearly as follows:

"My Lord, not only I am not a friend to this bill, but I shall hold every one to be my enemy who shall vote for it; and if these words are not sufficiently expressive, I leave your Lordship at liberty to use such others as may appear more expressive to you."
