In compliance with the withes and advice of his triends, who had required of him not to puth. his experiment too far, on account of the latepais of the hour, he opened the valve, the Balfrom fill continued to atcend, as was indicated by the Barometer, at length the Mercury became flationary, and he marked it at fifteen inches ninety-nine hundredths, equivalent near-

ly to two truli miles in height.

At length the force of afcent was overcome, and he descended for some time flowly, and repailed the upper range of clouds, foon after which he met with a current which carried him to the Eastward, as he feemed to be perfuaded from the relative polition of the Sun, and his progress over the furface of the lower cloud; which opinion feems to be verified from bence, that upon he approaching the edge of the cloud, a chain opened to his view which d'eus red the Bay of Dublin beneath. It was not long before he repassed this range of clouds also, and heard the noise of thip carpenters, and the barking of a thip dog; he was at this time in a contrary current of air to the Westward, and was carried over the frand near Lord Charlemont's feat, at Marino, and descending fafi; the tide being low he threw out his grappling, the fluke of which being badly wrought, broke with the strain, prefently a prodigious concourse of people crouded around him, and laying hold of the rope, he was landed in perfeet fafety: The people who were prefent at his defcent, teltified their applaule by carrying him in his Car with the Balloon floating over it on their fhoulders, to Lord Charlemont's house in Dublin, whilst all ranks of people vied with each other in congratulation on his fafety, and admiration of his intrepidity.
