Delegates from the several
Volunteer Corps that are to be reviewed at
Dublin, on Monday the 6th of June next, un-
animously elected Earl Charlemont Reviewing-
General, and Major Gudgeon Exercising-Offi-
cer. They also unanimously agreed upon a
second review to be at the Curragh, in com-
pliment to his Grace the Duke of Leinster,
whom they intend as their Reviewing-General
there.

Wednesday morning, between three and four
o'clock, two villains attempted breaking into
the house of Mr. John Sutherland, steward to
General Sandford, at Lexlip Castle, and suc-
ceeded so far as to open the shutters, and break
the fast of the parlour window; the noise al-
larm'd the servant maid, who ran into the
room, which being observed by one of them,
who had half his body through the fast he
threw a bar of iron at her, which fortun-
ately missed; the courageous girl then ran
to the window, and with the shutters forced
the villain out, when his companion threw a
glass bottle at her, which cut her desperately
in the breast, at the same time snatching at a
silver candlestick she held in her hand, but
miss'd it; the noise by this time alarm'd the
family, and the servant, with a resolution that
does honor to her sex, kept the window fast
till they came to her assistance, when the vil-
lains were obliged to decamp without their
booty. It is supposed there were more in
company; and the servant says she can swear
to the one that threw the bottle at her.

Monaghan, Jan. 21. On the 11th instant
was escorted into Bailieborow, by a number of
the Volunteers, a cannon, a 20 pounder, for
the use of the corps; it was purchased in Dub-
lin by a private, (James Reilly, Mathematician,
which shews a spirit and attachment to
the cause, not to be equalled by any within
our knowledge.

Galway, Jan. 24. Last Friday was commit-
ted to the County Gaol, by Jonathan Cope,
Esq; Thomas Cusack, and Patrick Creanan,
charged upon oath with being seen in the streets
at Ballinasloe, on Thursday night the 7th of
October last, about eight o'clock, in company
with the late Patrick Bellew, Esq; being the
same night the said Bellew was murdered.

Cionmel, Jan. 27. Last Friday night, two
fellows armed went to the house of Mr. Ryan,
near Pallas Grane, and demanded liquor, Mr.
Ryan told them he had none, they then shot
him, of which he instantly died.—Note, this
is the third audacious unprovoked murder com-
mitted in that neighbourhood within these few
months.

Committed to jail the 25th inst. by John
Power, Esq; Wm. Ryan, otherwise Stephen,
Richard Maunsell, and Mathew Ryan, other-
wise Matta, all of Tipperary, charged on
oath with having on the night of the 21st inst.
burglariously broke open the dwelling house of
Bryan Rearden; they are also charged with
having on the night of the 16th of November
last, burglariously broke open the stable door
of Richard Butler, of Keylong, Esq; and felo-
niously stealing thereout two horses, value
thirty pounds, sterling, the property of the
said Richard Butler, Esq. A party of the
Tipperary Volunteers, under the command of
Lieutenant Evans, escorted the above prisoners
to town, and lodged them in jail.

Kilkenny, Jan. 26. On Thursday evening,
John Keating, blacksmith, and Dan. Lynch,
servant, both of Callan, stopped a traveller
named Nicholas Power, on the high road be-
tween Callan and Mullinahow, and robbed
him of 12s. 11d. a pair of stockings, and a
stock buckle; they were apprehended next day,
and examinations sworn against them before
Sam. Ladyman, Esq; by whom they were
committed to our county Gaol, under an
escort of the Royal Irish Dragoons.

Waterford, Jan. 25. On Friday last Samuel
Curtis, John Crawley, Richard Curtis, James
Curtis, Thomas Samuel Roberts, William No-
ble, William Raycroft, John Taylor, James
Dodd, John Murray, George Wilson, and
James West, were severally admitted and sworn
into privilege freedom and office of freemen of
this city, by William Newport, Esq; mayor,
by virtue of twelve pefenptory mandamus's
which issued out of his Majesty's court of
King's-bench for that purpose.

Cork, Jan. 27. Committed to County Gaol,
the 3d. inst. by Sam. Jervois, John Hymud,
for horse-stealing;—the 12th by Tho. Ovgan,
Esq; John Sullivan, for being concerned in the
murder of John Murphy;—the 13th by Roger
Connor, Esq; John Post and Sarah Post, for
pig-stealing;—the 14th by the Rev. Thomas
Bulhe, Elizabeth Nagle, Mich. Dooly and
Mich. Horan, the two former charged with
various offences, and the latter with pig-steal-
ing;—the 19th by Tho. Butler, Esq; John
Haly, Patrick and Charles Coffey, for cow-
stealing;—the 23d by John Warren, Esq;

perpetrated in the neighbourhood of Donmore.
—One Thomas Mackee having lost a sheep,
procured a warrant of search, and went in
company with five or six other persons in hopes
of discovering how that part of his property
was made away with, after diligent search in
many houses, &c. which proved abortive, they
came to the house of one Bryen O'Bryen, in a
wall convenient to which they found the head
of a sheep, to which one Patrick Meer, then
present, has positively sworn to be that of the
sheep stolen from Mackee, and of which they
were in quest; from this and other concurring
circumstances, informations of felony were lodged
against O'Bryen.—About ten days ago, a
number of desperadoes, among whom were
three of O'Bryen's brothers, came armed to
the Cabbin of Meer, which they entered at
day-light, and pulling the object of their cruelty
to some distance from his his hut, used him in a
manner too shocking to relate, for after many
acts of unheard of cruelty they cut off one of
his ears; but, we hope, that the savages who
could be guilty of such barbarity, will not
be suffered to escape with impunity.
