As was ordered on a motion of Sir J. Blaquiere, "that the proper Officer lay before the House, an account of all the presentments in the last twelve months by the grand juries of the county, and of the county of the city of Dublin, for the last twelve months, for the repairs of coach ways."

Tuesday judgment was pronounced in the King's Bench against Mr. Rourke, for defamation, in the case of Alderman James, when the Court thought proper to sentence him to six months imprisonment, to pay a fine of one hundred pounds, and procure sureties for future good conduct.

Letters patent have passed the Great Seal appointing Warden Flood, Esq; Dr. of Laws, and member of Parliament for the borough of Baltinglass, Judge of his Majesty's High Court of Admiralty of Ireland.

A motion of thanks to the Volunteers of Ireland would on Tuesday last have been moved for by Mr. Flood, if a severe fit of the gout had not prevented him from coming down to the House; we hope this indisposition will be of short duration, so that this country may enjoy, in full vigour, the matchless abilities of its great defender.
