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history of the Dublin Aggregate Meeting, as also that of Kilmainham, together with their resolutions, as an excuse to authorise the proceedings against Mr. Reilly.

At a quarter past two the question being put the House divided, Ayes 71, Noes 143.

Mr. Flood gave notice, that he should on Saturday make a motion to vindicate the house, which the great majority of the night would not dare to negative.

Friday, Feb. 25.

Mr. Flood said, he had last night given notice, that he would on Saturday next make a motion which he considered a necessary one to vindicate the honor of the House—to establish a general principle, and which motion no man could give a negative to. He therefore moved, that it be an instruction to the Committee on Courts of Justice to sit to-morrow at 4 o'clock.

Sir J. Parnel declared if the Hon. Member meant again to bring forward the motion, which had been so ably and amply debated the preceding night, he would oppose going into the Committee; he thought the matter had been sufficiently discussed already.

Mr. Griffith said he was unable to account for the very extraordinary line of conduct observed by the Treasury-bench, in refusing every paper or information which was demanded by the Gentlemen who took an active part in the nation:—that it was the more surprising, as it did not in any sort concord with the measures adopted by the administration in England.—Even last night, the conduct of his Majesty's Attorney General was an insult on the dignity of this House; and I would have taken notice of it then, had I not been too much interested in the importance of the debate, and had I not feared that Gentlemen who supported the question of attachment, would have been glad to have shifted the grounds of the argument to a question of order.

The Provost called Mr. Griffith to order, and said, that he never heard a debate better conducted or more decency preserved than during that of last night.

Mr. Griffith. It would be very improper in me at the time I am standing up for the dignity and honour of the House, to transgress the bounds of order myself.—I am told I am out of order in adverting to any thing passed in another debate. I bow to the authority of the House, and I will not persist in an error.

The Attorney General begged that the Hon. Member might proceed; he had accused him by name, of having insulted the dignity of this House, and he must insist on his bringing forward his charge, or retracting what he said.

Mr. Flood declared, if the motion was negatived, it should not frustrate his intention of bringing forward his resolution to-morrow.

The question being put, there appeared for going into the committee, Ayes 21, Noes 59.

Mr. Flood then moved, that the proper officer do to-morrow lay before the House the rule books of the Crown side of the King's Bench, for the years 1761, 1762, and 1763.

The Attorney General said the proper officer lived out of town, and could not have notice in time to attend to-morrow.
