fr. Plood. I shall agree with the amendment. The Provoit. The common law of England ithe fame with that of Ireland ; except where ithas been allowed by Irish flatute. I admit tie hon, gentleman's principle, we only differ is one point, which is, that in the late cafe, the law hath been violated. The main queftion on which the whole depends is this, was Mr. Reilly an officer of the Court, or was he not? [Here he went into a long disquisition of that point, and went over molt of the former arguments.] I have fpoke to my learned friend Mr. Fitzgerald, to drop his amendment, and he thath agreed to one I propole, which is, after the word law, to add, " in England and in Ireland; and does not appear to have been extended in this kingdom beyond the fame,"and to expunge all the remaining words, for which I would fubfitute thefe.

Mr. J. Proby Ofborne, [Member for Carysfort] after a handfome apology for not expreffing his fentiments before on the queftion, on account of indifpolition, reprobated in the fcvereft manner the improper ufe that the Court of King's-Bench had lately made of its power to iffue attachments against Sheriffs, for actions not relating to the Court. He adduced a number of precedents in point, and concluded a very eloquent speech against Mr. Reilly's attachment, with fome uppolite flictures on the affumed and unconflicational (as he called it) interference of an armed Convention and the Congress, in its endeavours to alter the confitution

Mr. Flood. The amendment proposed by the It, hon. gentleman, is defigned to defiroy the force of my motion, If the principle of law is the fame in both kingdoms, fire practice is allowed to differ. Hence it is evident, the amendment is not founded, I fhall therefore propole to amend that amendment by inferting after it thefe words,-" nor ought it ever to be extended farther in Ireland, than in England,

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The Attorney General,-Though no man can deny that the common law of England is the fame as that of Ireland; yet will any man tell me, that the necessity of attaching Sheriffs occurs as often in England as in Ireland ? will any man tell me that law procedes are executed here by the Sheriffs, and that it is not common-Iy neceffary te have the content of the Lord of the foil in this kingdoin to have a writ executed? It is not fo in England, every man lends his hand to the execution of the law; the people are not encouraged to fet it at defiance,there is no Congress, no armed Convention in that kingdom. Mr. Michael Smyth. The practice of attachments, has, I am proud to find, been aiready abdicated in our Court of Exchequer, which has wilely adopted the practile of the Courts in England, which is many infrances have declined fuch proceedings, as for example, in the cafe of Kennet, Lord Mayor of London, against whom, the Court of King's Bench proceeded by information, and not by attachment. Mr. Arthur Wolfe, [Meaiber for Coleraine] followed the Attorney General in reprobating the partial and improper conduct of the Sheriffs and people in the country, even murderers found flicher and fafety. Mr. Flood. Why will gentlemen dwell on the corruption of our Sherifis, who know by what corrupt influence they are appointed; not as they ought to be, or, as in England by the judges, but illegally to pleate a man, who gave government a vote. Our Judges, inftead of complaining of Sheriffs, fhould interfere, and fee that they are legally nominated. As to the people of Ireland, the buik of them, until lately, had no interest in the laws, and naturally, were careles how they were executed The Houfe divided on Mr. Flood's amendment, which was negatived - Ayes 48, Tellers, Sir Edward Newenham, Mr. Parlons-Noes 120 Mr. Serjeant Fitzgerald, Mr. A. Wolfe, It divided again on the first amendment, which was carrid, Ayes 117, Noes 50. Tellers as before. The words at the end of Mr. Flood's first motion were expanded, and the motion thus amended was carried without a di-Vilion.
