IRISH HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Tuesday, March 8.

Two more of the money bills read a third
time, and ordered to the Lords.

Messengers from the Lords, intimating that
they had agreed to the loan duty, and mutiny
bill.

Mr. Griffith moved for leave to bring in a
bill, "to amend the act passed last session, for
issuing Treasury bills, to the amount of 20,000,
for the use of Captain Brooke."

Leave granted accordingly.

Mr. Foster presented a bill for the better
maintenance and support of the Foundling
Hospital.

Mr. Beresford moved, "That the proper
officer lay before the House the last report of
the Pilot Committee, laid before the Privy
Council, pursuant to the act of Parliament for
that purpose." Ordered accordingly.

Mr. Beresford then moved, "for leave to
bring in a bill to improve the port and harbour
of Dublin, by regulating the Ballast and Pilot
Offices.—Granted.

Wednesday, March 9.

Read a third time and passed, the following
engrossed bills, which were ordered to the
Lords.—The Carriage Duty Bill.—The bill
for explaining and amending the bill for the
better regulation of the Corn trade.—The
Coffee trade bill.—The bill for encouragement
of the Fishery on the North West coast.—And
the bill for granting 4000l. for the encourage-
ment of the Linen and Hempen Manufacture.

A message from the Lords by Mr Justice
Robinson and Dr. Vesey, that they had agreed
to, and returned the following bills:

The bill for an additional duty on Wine,
Cyder, Beer, Ale, Hops, &c.—The bill for
the better advancement of Trade, and grant-
ing certain duties to his Majesty.

The House in a committee on the following
bills, Mr. Mason, in the chair,

Went through the bill for preventing the se-
duction of artificers and manufacturers from the
kingdom.—Also the bill for granting a bounty
on the exportation of gun powder of Irish man-
ufacture.—Also the bill for the better regula-
tion of trade, and payment of bounties.—Also
the bill for explaining and amending an act for
the better regulation of trade with, and open-
ing an intercourse with America.

All which Mr. Mason reported, agreed to
the reports, and the bills ordered to be en-
grosed.

The Attorney General presented a bill for
the better payment of the creditors of the
Bank of Messrs. Warran and Company, of
the City, and the regulation of their affairs. The
second reading of which is postponed till the
9th of April next.

Mr. Griffith presented a bill for the better
settlement of manufacturers distant from the
City of Dublin.—Ordered to be read a second
time to-morrow.

Mr. J. here, after stating the frauds used
in buying and selling of light gold, moved
for leave to bring in a bill to prevent such

of the revenue officer to prevent frauds, it
would be giving an opportunity to work up the
present stock without duty. This clause is
verbatim with the act passed in Great Britain
in Queen Anne's reign, which has existed eighty
years, and no inconvenience has been found in
that time.

Mr. Hayes moved, that persons not having
more than five barrels of malt in their possession
on or before the 25th of March inst. be ex-
empted from the penalty of 20l. and who shall
not make the return within ten days after that
day.

Mr. Corry wished the exception to be ex-
tended in point of time.

Sir L. O'Brien. This will not pass into a
law before the 25th of March, as it will
hardly receive the royal assent before that
time; then how will any person know the pe-
nalties they are under, without proper notice?
I have often known the professors of the law,
whose duty it is to know it, unacquainted with
it by the sudden passing and commencement of
it before it was published.

Mr. Foster and Mr. Beresford said the bill
would be printed, and notice given.

Mr. Griffith wished for a better mode than
the present of promulgating the laws, and
hoped the act would be printed and posted up
in all the towns of the kingdom.

An amendment was moved by Sir Lucius
O'Brien that persons should have a month's
time after the passing of the act for returning
an account of their stock, which was ne-
gated without a division.

Thursday, March 10.

Mr. Charles O'Neil moved for leave to bring
in a bill to amend the civil bill process.

Read a second time the bill to prevent the
breaking down or destroying of bridges, when
the question was put on committing this bill.

Sir Lucius O'Brien warmly opposed it, he
said that though this bill seemed of a general
nature, it was chiefly intended to preclude a
Bridge lately built on the river near Six mile-
bridge, by which the navigation was obstruct-
ed; and to remove which nuisance a suit was
actually depending in the courts. He entered
into a long detail of a man, who taking ad-
vantage of the law that permits the erecting of
a toll bridge, where there has been a ferry, be-
gan to build a bridge and when it was nearly fi-
nished obtained a grant for a ferry, which he
never established but under colour of that
grant settled the toll of the bridge.

Sir Hugh Dillon Maffey, mentioned the ri-
otous destruction of a bridge at Ennis in the
county of Clare, and thought every step should
be taken to prevent the destruction of bridges.

Mr. Sejeant Toler. The laws subsisting are
sufficient to prevent any malicious and wicked
destruction of bridges; and as those words are
not inserted in the bill, I am against increasing
the criminal code, already too voluminous,
embarrassing to the public and troublesome to
the judges.

Sir Henry Harlsonge defended the necessity
of his bill.

Mr. Griffith asked if there were laws to pu-
nish the breakers down of bridges; and being
told by Mr. Toler there were, he replied then
there is no occasion to make more.

The question was put on committing the bill.
The House divided.

Ayes 10—Noes 30—Majority 11
