

We hear from the county of Leitrim, that a duel was fought on the 16th inst. between Col. St. George, and George Nugent Reynolds, Esq; in consequence of some disagreement between them at the last assizes of Carrick. Their seconds were, Mr. Nesbit, and Mr. Birchall. The coolness and intrepidity with which each Gentleman discharged his pistol, at a small distance, is an infallible proof of his personal courage, and Col. St. George's declaration after their first discharge, that if more was done he would not fire his reserved shot at Mr. Reynolds, places him in a noble point of view. — At this instant, and just as Mr. Reynolds called to his second for another pistol, the second very properly interposed, and a cordial reconciliation took place — Mr. Reynolds was shot through the hat, the Col. escaped untouched.

The two great national questions of Parliamentary Reform and Attachments, will shortly be agitated in this kingdom, whatever may be the fate of the former in Great Britain. The freeholders of the county of Roscommon will meet on those important points the 6th of April, being the day appointed by the Sheriff for that purpose, at the requisition of Sir Edward Crofton, one of the spirited Representatives of that county, who, with his worthy colleague, wish to be possessed of the sentiments and receive the instructions of their constituents previous to the subject's coming before the Legislature.

It will be in vain to enact laws to prevent emigration, whilst oppression keeps men down and poverty stares them in the face. The only method to keep our people at home, will be to give them employment; for nothing but real distress can conquer the natural love of our native land, inherent in every breast.

The 6th regiment was under orders to embark for Canada—that arrangement has since been changed by royal mandate, and the 65th, Lord Harrington's—ordered upon that service.

On Tuesday the 12th of April, we hear, the bill for a more equal representation of the people of Ireland in Parliament, is intended to be brought into our House of Commons by Mr. Flood. On that day the assizes, and the quarter sessions throughout the kingdom will be at an end, so that our country Gentlemen, we mean, the *puſedo* ones, will have no excuse left them to humbug their constituents with, to whom they are solemnly pledged to support this great measure.

It is said that in consequence of a mob assembling in Newry some days ago, about the play-house, a number of Volunteers turned out to suppress the tumult, in which some of the populace were wounded, and one of the Volunteers hurt.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Thursday, March 24.

The House met pursuant to adjournment from the 15th inst.

Mr. Colville moved for leave to bring in a bill to explain and amend the laws relative to perjury.

The business that gave rise to this bill was this: A report has gone abroad of several forgeries to a large amount on the national bank, having been discovered. Mr. Colville said this was not the fact, as but two cases had appeared, one of an indorsement for 30l. for which a young man was tried and acquitted, on a doubt arising whether the bank could prosecute as a corporate body; and it is with respect to this controverted point that this bill is introduced; the other was a forged acceptance of a bill for 250l. the forger of which is not yet discovered.

Mr. Gardiner's road-bill was postponed till Monday fortnight.

Mr. Dennis Browne declared there was great mismanagement in the conduct of the managers of the Shannon navigation; some of the commissioners taking 200l. a year, and giving 100l. a year to clerks; he, therefore, moved that a committee be appointed to examine into the state of the Shannon navigation, which was appointed accordingly.

A message from the Lords—That their Lordships had agreed to a bill for granting sundry bounties on exportation of sundry commodities, and to a bill for county infirmaries.

Mr. Gardiner moved for leave to bring in a bill to amend the act for the circular road round Dublin.

Mr. Boyd's bill for registering deeds and wills having met with great opposition, was withdrawn; and he brought in another bill for the same purpose in which many excep-

Mr. Alderman Warren presented a bill to regulate the fees of Notary Publics. To be read again on the 4th of April.

A message from the Lords, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, commanding the attendance of the Commons.

The House went, and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported that his Grace, the Lord Lieutenant had been pleased to give the Royal Assent to the following acts, viz.

1. An act for granting to his Majesty an additional duty on wine, hides, beer, ale, and other goods and merchandizes therein mentioned, and prohibiting the importation of all gold and silver lace, and of all combricks and lawns, except of the manufacture of Great Britain, and of all hops except of the growth of Great Britain, and of all glass except from Great Britain.

2. An act for granting the sum of twenty thousand pounds to the Speaker of the House of Commons, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the senior Commissioners of his Majesty's revenue, the Right Hon. Luke Gardiner, and the Right Hon. Thomas Connolly, or any four of them, for the purposes therein mentioned.—the north west fishery.

3. An act for licensing hawkers and pedlars, petty chapmen and other persons.

4. An act for granting the sum of four thousand pounds for the purposes therein mentioned, and for continuing the several duties granted by an act passed in this kingdom, in the third year of his present Majesty's reign, entitled an act for continuing the several duties given by former acts of Parliament to the flaxen and hempen manufacture.

5. An act for granting certain duties on licenses to be taken out by the several persons therein mentioned.

6. An act for granting to his Majesty the duties therein mentioned on coffee.

7. An act for regulating and extending the tobacco trade, and for granting to his Majesty the duties therein mentioned.

8. An act for granting to his Majesty certain duties on carriages.

9. An act for granting the sum of three thousand pounds to the Lord Chancellor and Chief Judges for the purposes therein mentioned,—building the offices on the Inns-quay.

10. An act for granting the sum of five thousand pounds to the Dublin Society, for the purposes therein mentioned.

11. An act for punishing mutiny and desertion, and for the better payment of the army and their quarters within this kingdom.

12. An act for granting to his Majesty, the several aids, duties, rates, impositions and taxes therein particularly expressed, to be applied to the payment of the interests of the sums therein provided for, and towards the discharge of the said principal sums, in such manner as therein is directed, and for such other purposes as are therein mentioned.

13. An act to promote the linen and hempen manufactures, by increasing the supply of Irish flax-seed, and encouraging the export of linens and sail-cloth, and for granting to his Majesty the duties therein mentioned.

14. An act for granting the sum of one thousand pounds to the Hibernian society, towards supporting the said charity.

15. An act for granting the sum of ten thousand pounds to the governors of the Foundling Hospital, or Work-house, for the purposes therein mentioned.

16. An act for granting the sum of eight thousand six hundred pound, to the corporation for relief of the poor of the city of Dublin.

17. An act for granting the sum of one thousand pounds to the governors of the Hibernian School for the support of that charity.

18. An act for granting the sum of five thousand pounds, for the board of first fruits, for the purposes therein mentioned.

19. An act for granting to his Majesty the duty therein mentioned, to be paid to the Trustees of the Royal Exchange.

20. An act for granting the sum of nine thousand pounds to the incorporated society, for supporting the Protestant Charter Schools of this kingdom.

21. An act for regulating the sugar trade, and for granting to his Majesty the duties therein mentioned.

22. An act for repairing the road from Nenagh to Curranaboy bridge.

23. An act for granting to his Majesty, certain duties and rates, upon the postage and conveyance of all letters and packages within this kingdom.

24. An act for the advancement of trade, and for granting to his Majesty, the several duties therein mentioned.

25. An act for granting to his Majesty, the several duties therein mentioned, to be levied by the commissioners for managing the stamp duties.

26. An act to explain and amend the several acts made in this kingdom, to encourage the building of houses, and making other improve-
