The happy effects of these measures are already visible, and I trust will soon rescue the reputation of the nation from those foul calumnies which have not only disgraced her character, but obstructed her improvement. Notwithstanding the variety and importance of these objects which have engaged the attention of the Commons, they have not yet been unmindful of their duty to his Majesty or to the Public in other respects;— they have made ample provision for the exigencies of the state, for the honourable support of his Majesty's government, and for the maintenance of public credit; and though to put an end to the ruinous practice of running in debt, they have found themselves under a necessity of imposing additional taxes to the amount of about one hundred and forty thousand pounds a year, in order to raise the revenue to the level of the public expence; yet they trust they have done it in such a manner that the burden will be little felt by the people; and they rely, with confidence on your Grace's justice and affection for this kingdom, that you will prevent, to the utmost of your power, any deficiencies, by enjoying the strictest economy in every department of the state; and that your Grace will represent to his Majesty, in the most favourable light, the conduct of his faithful Commons, by whose command, and in whose name, I now present to your Grace for the royal assent, the bills, &c.

measures, &c. fame, as also of Barley, and other Corn or Grain found waiting for making of Malt; and shall make report thereof to the Collector of the District, and leave a true copy of such report with the owner of said Malt, on penalty of paying 40s.—All persons who shall obstruct or not permit such officers to enter such Houses, shall forfeit 20l.—Persons having more than five Barrels of Malt, shall, within ten days from 25th of March 1785, make a Return to the Collector of the District, of all Malt in their possession, and shall monthly and every month, make a true return of Malt made, or forfeit 20l.—All Duties due for Malt on the 25th March 1785, to be cleared off in three months.—All Duties to be paid in four months after making a return, or for refusing or neglecting to make such return and payment, forfeit 50l.—Persons concealing Malt from the Gauger, &c. forfeit 100l.—Setting up, altering, or making use of any Cistern, &c. or any Kiln, Floor, &c. without giving notice to the Collector, under Penalty of 50l.—Maltsters in Cities or Market-Towns shall 24 hours before wetting Corn, give notice to the Gauger; those living in the Country to give like notice in 48 hours; and all Corn to be wet between 4 in the morning, and 9 in the Evening.—One shilling allowed to every Common Brewer for every Barrel of strong Beer or Ale brewed by him, upon proof of payment of the Duty hereby on Malt, or security given.—Maltsters to register with the Officer appointed for that purpose, their names, place of abode, and also the dimensions of the several Floors in his Malt-house, specifying the number of square feet which they contain, and also the dimensions of the several Steeps or Cisterns therein, with the quantity of Barley which each is capable of holding, under the penalty of 20s. for each Barrel of Malt which shall be made, sold or exposed to sale, by him, without having registered as aforesaid; for every which registry, the sum of one shilling, and no more shall be demanded and paid.
