The late humane and well-judged augmentation of the half pay of the marine Officers in England, proves that the opposition of so favourite a Minister as Lord North was, a few years ago, weighed little with the majority who carried that measure, which, with a true Court spirit, he resisted as long as he was able, under the worn-out pretext of expediency. It were much to be wished, that our own patriotic Members would endeavour to obtain a like benefit for subaltern military officers and privates, whose present pay can neither subsist the one as a gentleman, nor the other as the meanest artizan. Our hospital pensioners also deserve some notice from a humane legislature, when it is considered, that they have dedicated the best portion of their lives, and sacrificed rivers of their blood, for the peace, safety and aggrandizement of the empire and the constitution, of which we so justly boast. A small addition would be of great moment to these brave men, many of whom bear the most honourable marks of valour, and the intrepid countenance with which they met the enemies of their King and country in those days of trial, when nature recoils on herself, and sickens at destruction. These noble acts would reflect a glory on his Majesty's reign, more splendid than the victories of Hocksted or Blenheim, and might be effected without the smallest expence, by striking off the scandalous pensions, so disgraceful to the kingdom.
