Bill."

Mr. Curren defended the conduct of the
Gentlemen appointed to bring in the Reform
Bill.

The Attorney General then withdrew his
motion, and the House adjourned to next day.
Friday, April 28.

The House sat in committee on the bill to
prevent fraudulent buying and selling of gold
coin.—Reported progress, ordered to sit again.

Another mode of setting the law at defiance
has been recently attempted, than those which
for the last twelve months have disgraced the
annals of this country. A Counsellor and a
Major, on an affair of honour, lately entered
into a recognizance of 1000l. each, before the
Court of King's-Bench, for the preservation of
the peace. They have thought proper, never-
theless, to fight a duel in the face of their
bond. The court, however, with its accus-
tomed impartiality and justice, have ordered
the recognizance to be sent into his Majesty's
Exchequer, to be estreated, and the sum to be
levied by the sale of their effects, or their per-
sons to be imprisoned. It is to be hoped this
exemplary punishment will not only be a means
of enforcing a due obedience to the laws, but
of checking that rage for duelling which has
too long reflected a stigma on the civilization
of mankind.

We hear that the military experiments, on
the use of the bayonet, practising for some time
past in the garrison, under the direction of the
Commander in Chief, are in such a state of
maturity as to appear to be of the most momen-
tous consequence to the army of the Empire.
The ingenious author is said to be a gentleman
of this country, to whom it must not be a lit-
tle flattering, that the Commander in Chief
has so highly approved of his labours; and
that the Earl of Harrington and the officers of
the garrison, made every effort to forward the
completion of the experiments, from a convic-
tion that our armies may be rendered infinitely
more formidable in the art of war, than they
have heretofore been.

Last week a duel was fought in the county of
Wicklow, between Lieut. Col. B—ll and
Mr. B—r, both of this city. When the
gentlemen took their ground, it was agreed
that the first mentioned gentleman should have
the first fire, which took place, and broke Mr.
B—r's jaw-bone; the latter immediately covered
the wound with his left hand, acknowledged he
was in fault, and fired his pistol in the air, de-
claring at the same time, if his antagonist was
satisfied with the concession, to go on.
The seconds very properly interposed, and the
gentlemen were reconciled.
