Extract of a letter from Cashel, dated April 30.

" We know not what a day may bring
about. The inhabitants of about fifty decent
houses, and cabbins, who enjoyed their proper-
ty, and breakfasted in security yesterday morn-
ing, are now lamenting over the ashes of their
worldly substance, without a place to lay their
heads. About three o'Clock yesterday, a fire
broke out in a Cabin on the Camas-road, where
they were brewing, it quickly communicated to
others. The people's distraction at such a ca-
lamity in this town, is such, that there is no
making them do any thing but screech. You
may remember a row of high decent thatched
houses fronting this street, as you come in from
Golden. I saw the first of the fire and used
my utmost endeavours to prevail on them, to
apply wet blankets to the house that was next,
but still untouched;—but no one stirred. In
ten minutes after, the whole range was on fire,
and the dryness of the thatch, made it impossi-
ble to stop the flames where they once reached.
Luckily one Gentleman got blankets put on the
Cabin at this side, which probably prevented
the whole town from being consumed. Had it
happened at night, in all probability the greater
part of the town would have been burnt to
ashes. The poor inhabitants are completely
beggar'd. The soldiers behaved with the ut-
most humanity and activity. A collection is
begun for the relief of the sufferers, which I
advised to be carried on briskly, before peo-
ple's feelings, which, on those occasions, are
too apt to evaporate, and subside."

Saturday, April 30.
HOUSE OF COMMONS.
The House sat in Committee on an engrossed
Bill from the Lords, to amend the acts for the
better regulating the Office of Sheriffs, and as-
certaining their Fees. It was afterwards re-
ported, and ordered to be read a third time on
Monday next.

The Circular-Road Bill was reported, and
ordered to be engrossed.

The Order for going into a Committee on
the Cork Bank Bill, being read, the House re-
solved itself therein.

The Right Hon. Luke Gardiner in the Chair.
Sir Francis Hutchinson, previous to the read-
ing of the Bill, observed to the Committee that
there was a Clause in it that empowered the
Trustees to apply all sums they may receive
under this Act, in discharge of all the Debts of
those Bankers, in such Order and Course as
those Trustees shall judge most for the Benefit
of the Creditors. He observed that this Clause
was unjust, and in direct Opposition to the
Bankruptcy Laws, both of England and Ire-
land, which direct that the Creditors shall be
paid rateably in proportion to their respective
Debts.

The Attorney General said the bill gave a
remedy to any Creditor who should think him-
self aggrieved, by an application to the Court
of Chancery, which might give him redress in
a summary way.

Sir Francis Hutchinson replied, that it was
unreasonable to expose the Creditor to the ex-
pence and trouble of such an application.

The bill was then read paragraph by para-
graph.

Mr. Molineux spoke against the principle of
the bill, as an ill precedent, and an improper
interference of Parliament in a case which the
laws for Bankers and Bankrupts had sufficiently
provided regulations: He then moved, that the
Chairman quit the Chair.

The bill was supported by the Attorney Gen-
eral, Mr. D. Latouche, and Sir N. Lawless,
as highly advantageous to the creditors.
Mr. Molineux withdrew his motion.

Monday, May 2.
The House went into a committee on the
bill for the encouragement of the fisheries, re-
ported, and ordered to sit again.

Mr. Forbes then moved that an address be
presented to the Lord Lieutenant, " That he
would lay before his Majesty, the humble de-
fense of the House, that he would be graciously
