INTERCOURSE WITH IRELAND.

THE House having resolved itself into a Committee on the Irish Trade.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer moved, that the Committee agree with the resolution for allowing mutual drawbacks on spirits.

Mr. Fox next rose, and stated his objections to the particular resolution then under consideration; he said he had amendments to offer to the whole of the resolutions, as also the immediate one, but said that it was rather late at this hour to enter more fully into the question, and therefore wished the Right Hon. Gentleman to agree to a motion, that the Chairman report progress and have leave to sit again.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer made a speech of considerable length in reply to the different objections made by the several members on the other side of the House. Mr. Fox replied.—The cry of question was now vociferated, when the Chairman put the question of adjournment, which produced a division: Ayes 90. Noes 195.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer then moved the original question, but Mr. Eden said he had an amendment to propose, which he should submit to the opinion of the committee, which he did; and another amendment, which were adopted by the committee; the original resolution, together with the amendments were then put, and carried without a division.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer said, that he should submit to the consideration of the Committee the next resolution, but as several amendments were suggested by Mr. Eden and Mr. Sheridan, he agreed to postpone the further consideration of that and the other resolutions till Monday next, to which day the House adjourned at half past six o'clock this morning.

Extract of a letter from Madrid, April 19.

"The utmost endeavours are exerted to insure the success of the projected expedition against Algiers, Government have sent orders to the ports for all the ships to be ready to sail by the 26th of May, and numbers of merchant vessels are taken up as transports; several companies of grenadiers will sail under the escort of a small squadron to Minorca, where there are already 10,200 troops. In the course of the next month the rest of the troops destined to besiege Algiers by land will set out; that army will be composed of 30,000 men. The Court, in order to facilitate the taking of that place, propose to make themselves masters of some posts near the fortress, and there to form entrenchments for the army to put them under cover, in case any accident should happen to the fleet which is to bombard the place."

On Sunday morning a duel was fought in a field near Rochester, by Major G— and an Officer in the Navy, in which the latter was shot through the cheek, and lost three of his teeth; but the ball lodging in the bone of the lower jaw, it is thought by the Surgeons that the wound will be attended with no fatal consequences.
