

gentic copy of an Address, which was read by Mr Pitt in the House of Commons of Great Britain, on Monday evening last, and passed without a division. Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Great Britain in Parliament assembled, have taken into our most serious consideration, the important subject of commercial intercourse between Great Britain and Ireland recommended in your Majesty's speech at the opening of the present session the resolutions of the two Houses of Parliament of Ireland, which were laid before your Majesty's command, on the 22d of January last.

After a long and careful investigation of various questions necessarily arising out of this comprehensive subject, we have come to several Resolutions which we now humbly present to your Majesty, and which we trust will form the basis of an advantageous and permanent commercial settlement between your Majesty's kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland.

We have proceeded on the foundation of the resolutions of the Parliament of Ireland, in considering so extensive an arrangement have found it necessary to introduce some modifications and exceptions, and we have added such regulations and conditions as appeared to us indispensably necessary for establishing the proposed agreement on just and equitable principles, and for securing to both countries those commercial advantages, to an equal enjoyment of which they are in future entitled.

Your Majesty's subjects in Ireland being engaged in a full and lasting participation of trade with the British Colonies must, we are persuaded, acknowledge the justice of their continuing to enjoy it on the same terms with your Majesty's subjects in Great Britain.

And it is, we conceive, equally manifest, that as the ships and mariners of Ireland are to continue in all time to come to enjoy the same privileges with those of Great Britain, the same provisions should be adopted in Ireland as may be found necessary in this country, for putting those advantages exclusively to the benefit of the empire. This object is essentially connected with the maritime strength of your Majesty's dominions, and consequently with the safety and prosperity both of Great Britain and Ireland.

Our purpose in these Resolutions is to make alike, the Commercial Interests of your Majesty's subjects in both countries, and we are persuaded that the common prosperity of the Kingdoms will be thereby greatly advanced, and that the subjects of each will in future apply themselves to those branches of commerce, which can exercise with the most advantage, the wealth so diffused through every part operate as a general benefit to the whole. We therefore deem it indispensable, that the points should be secured as conditions necessary to the existence and duration of the agreement between the two countries. They can be carried into effect by laws to be passed in the Parliament of Ireland, which is alone competent to bind your Majesty's subjects in Kingdom, and whose legislative rights we ever hold as sacred as our own.

It remains for the Parliament of Ireland to determine according to their wisdom and discretion, these conditions, as well as of every part of the settlement proposed to be effected by mutual consent. We have thus performed our part in this important business, and we trust that, in the progress of its reciprocal interest and affection will insure that spirit of union and mutual assistance necessary to the great end which your Majesty's kingdoms have equally in view. In this persuasion we look forward with confidence to the final completion of a measure which while it tends to perpetuate harmony and friendship between the two Kingdoms, must cement their resources, uniting their strength, and consolidating their strength, afford every facility for the means of establishing on a permanent foundation the safety, prosperity, and the Empire.

Last Saturday the five following malefactors, Michael Shaughnessy, Jeremiah Reilly, Charles Fallon, James M'Mahon, and Thomas Cartwright, were executed at Gallows-hill, near Kilmainham; they were attended by two clergymen of the church of Rome, and behaved with great decency and penitence, acknowledging the justice of their sentence, and confessing many robberies, particularly that of the Widow Walsh, and a Mrs. Murphy; also the robbery of a dairyman at Kilmacud, for which one Murphy and others innocently suffered. Doyle, Roger Mathews, and Nicholas Lager, declared to the last moment their innocence of the crime for which they suffered.

The horrid circumstances which attended the execution of the five criminals on Saturday last, at Gallows-green, should, at length, excite the sagacity of the legislature, to devise some mode of punishment more effectual than death, since death, to the common mind, seems to have lost a great deal of its terrors. The unhappy wretches lately executed, were not above two minutes suspended when the gallows gave way, and thus half-strangled, they were hanged two at a time; those on the ground writhing in the convulsions of life and death.—Six more remaining in Kilmainham gaol for execution in a few days, it is expected by every human mind, that precautions will be taken to prevent the repetition of so painful a disaster.
