Give it to the cattle horfes to drink when cold; or if the cattle horles are any ways ill or under cover, give to them blood-warm. This drink is fo exremely nutritive that it nourishes the cattle sonithingly, replenishes the udders of the we with a prodigious quantity of milk, makes horses stale plentifully, and keeps them thy and ftrong ! and by this method one outs or hundred of hay will go as far as eight ten otherwife would do. - The cattle and horses do not feem to like it at first, but if they are kept till they are very thirsty, they will drink freely of it ever afterwards.

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The farmers and others in Sweden and other cold countries, who have cattle and horfes, when they are in want of fodder, confrantly arfue this method, and find the good effects from it; and there is no doubt but this method would have the same good effect on sheep in fevere weather, when the sheep are housed, or the land covered with fnow; especially if they were given a small quantity of fait, a practice used in Spain to make the wool fine and fost, to firengthen the sheep and prevent the rot; for the stronger the sheep are the greater quantity of wool they will produce, and which will be much finer and fofter than when the sheep are weak and lean,

The hay, after being used as before mensoned, and dried, may be used as litter for horses and cattle, make very good manure, and fave straw, which will be a considerable advantage, especially where there is a scarcity of fitaw.

N. B. By a handful of hay, is meant as much a person can grasp in his hand from a parcel of loofe hay .- And it is prefumed and wished, as the above method is so easy and fafe, that no person who has cattle, cows, horses, or sheep, will neglect to try it.

As the friends of Mr. Ponfonby have de clined a contest with Mr. Foster, for the Speaker's chair, the latter walks over the ground into it on Tuefday se'nnight. In the mean time, a variety of conjectures are every where heard, respecting the persons who are to succeed Mr. Foster's feveral employments; the Chancellorship of the Exchequer, it is faid, to devolves on Sir John Parnel; the place of hold Means, some say, will be filled by Mr. William Ponfonby, while others contend, that it is left open for the acceptance of a young patriot, whose great abilities in matters of trade have been much admired, particularly for his oth spirited efforts to regulate the East India business in this kingdom, and effect an equal-explanation of the Navigation Act. Mr. Foster is to retain his Patentee Place of Customer and Collector of the Port of Dublin. It is not yet mentioned, who is to furceed Sir John Parnel at the Revenue Board, in cafe the above arrangement takes place.

The glorious one hundred and ten patriotic members, who flood forward in the hour of danger, the supporters of their country's rights, will be more and more revered, as the contents of the commercial bill are more thoroughly understood .- Many persons considered the Fourth Proposition as the only obnoxious part of the whole fystem; but there is scarce a fingle clause in the bill now submitted to public attention, which is not only detrimental to the interest, but derogatory to the honour of Ireland.
