

...therefore, is recommended to those
 whose stock of hay is likely to fall
 short.

BOIL about a handful of hay in three gal-
 of water (and so in proportion of
 any greater or smaller quantity) or if the
 water is poured boiling on the hay, it will
 answer nearly as well. Give it to the cattle
 and horses to drink when cold; or if the cattle
 and horses are any ways ill or under cover, give
 it to them blood-warm. This drink is so ex-
 tremely nutritive that it nourishes the cattle
 astonishingly, replenishes the udders of the
 cows with a prodigious quantity of milk, makes
 the horses stale plentifully, and keeps them
 healthy and strong; and by this method one
 truss or hundred of hay will go as far as eight
 or ten otherwise would do.—The cattle and
 horses do not seem to like it at first, but if
 they are kept till they are very thirsty, they
 will drink freely of it ever afterwards.

The farmers and others in Sweden and other
 cold countries, who have cattle and horses,
 when they are in want of fodder, constantly
 pursue this method, and find the good effects
 from it; and there is no doubt but this method
 would have the same good effect on sheep in
 severe weather, when the sheep are housed,
 or the land covered with snow; especially if
 they were given a small quantity of salt, a
 practice used in Spain to make the wool fine
 and soft, to strengthen the sheep and prevent
 the rot; for the stronger the sheep are the
 greater quantity of wool they will produce,
 and which will be much finer and softer than
 when the sheep are weak and lean.

The hay, after being used as before men-
 tioned, and dried, may be used as litter for
 horses and cattle, make very good manure,
 and save straw, which will be a considerable
 advantage, especially where there is a scarcity
 of straw.

N. B. By a handful of hay, is meant as
 much a person can grasp in his hand from a
 parcel of loose hay.—And it is presumed and
 wished, as the above method is so easy and
 safe, that no person who has cattle, cows,
 horses, or sheep, will neglect to try it.

As the friends of Mr. Ponsonby have de-
 clined a contest with Mr. Foster, for the
 Speaker's chair, the latter walks over the ground
 into it on Tuesday se'night. In the mean
 time, a variety of conjectures are every where
 heard, respecting the persons who are to suc-
 ceed Mr. Foster's several employments; the
 Chancellorship of the Exchequer, it is said,
 devolves on Sir John Parnel; the place of
 Chairman to the Committee of Ways and
 Means, some say, will be filled by Mr. Wil-
 liam Ponsonby, while others contend, that it
 is left open for the acceptance of a young pa-
 triot, whose great abilities in matters of trade
 have been much admired, particularly for his
 spirited efforts to regulate the East India busi-
 ness in this kingdom, and effect an equal ex-
 planation of the Navigation Act. Mr. Foster
 is to retain his Patentee Place of Customer and
 Collector of the Port of Dublin. It is not yet
 mentioned, who is to succeed Sir John Parnel
 at the Revenue Board, in case the above ar-
 rangement takes place.

The glorious one hundred and ten patriotic
 members, who stood forward in the hour of
 danger, the supporters of their country's
 rights, will be more and more revered, as the
 contents of the commercial bill are more thor-
 oughly understood.—Many persons considered
 the Fourth Proposition as the only obnoxious
 part of the whole system; but there is scarce
 a single clause in the bill now submitted to
 public attention, which is not only detrimental
 to the interest, but derogatory to the honour
 of Ireland.
