

ned in justice, and they will, it is said, be satisfied with a settlement on the ground of the famous treaty proposed in the reign of Queen Anne, which was rejected by the British Parliament. You will therefore perceive that by one of those unaccountable resolutions in the state of affairs which no human prudence could have foreseen, the defeat of the Bill which Mr. Pitt and his colleagues so much pressed on both kingdoms is deemed here by all parties, to be the most fortunate circumstance for the Minister; as he would otherwise have found it impossible to negotiate successfully with Germany, Russia, or America."

It is rather unfortunate, when the legislature intends to be merciful, that they prevent their own intention from due operation. The benefit of the late insolvent act is only extended to those actually in custody since the first of January last—By this clause not one-fourth of those imprisoned for debt will be entitled to receive the benefits, by which means the wretches confined since the 2d of January may continue to languish years in prison, without producing one single advantage to society; nay, on the contrary, it is robbed of the benefits which might arise from the labours of such individuals. What a pity it is, that the laws of Holland are not adopted, which provides against personal imprisonment of the debtor, and yet contain rigour enough to do the creditor full justice.

As the inhabitants of Massachusetts Bay have ever been the first to shew a dislike to England, (though they are the only unmixed breed of the mother country, of all the American Colonies) the following curious circumstances, little known, attended the original foundation of the settlement: In 1614, the famous Captain John Smyth, accompanied by Captain Thomas Hunt, landed in New England, and having taken a particular view of the country, had some skirmishes with some of the native Indians, called Massachusetts; but having taken and cured a cargo or two of fish, he sent orders with Hunt to proceed to Spain in his ship, with the fish taken; and then he set out for England. But the knavish Hunt, not content with his seeming treasure, and stimulated by an avaricious desire of gain, took such iniquitous steps to procure it, as proved of fatal consequence to the infant colony; for as soon as Captain Smyth was departed, he enticed twenty-seven of the innocent Massachusetts on board, and carried them with his cargo to Malaga, where he sold the poor Indians, at twenty pounds a head. This made the natives break off all communication with a colony founded in treachery; but a party of Presbyterians, who had fled to Holland on account of religion, headed by John Robinson, their Minister, settled here, and obtained the first charters, in 1624; and in 1625, another party of Independents, headed by White of Dorchester, one of their ministers, joined their brethren in New England, and were, one with the other, so industrious, that in about twenty years they built forty towns, cultivated a large tract of land, and settled a good trade. A proof to fishermen, that cultivating the advantages of their own soil is all that is wanted to render them a happy people.
