You will therefore perceive that by one of those unaccountable resolutions in the state of affairs which no human prudence could have forefeen, the defeat of the Bill which Mr. Pitt and his colleagues fo much preffed on both kingdonis is deemed here by all parties, to be the most fortunate circumstance for the Minister; as he would otherwise have found it impossible to negociate faccessfully with Germany, Ruffia, or America."

It is rather unfortunate, when the legislature intends to be merciful, that they prevent their own intention from due operation. The benefit of the late infolvent act is only extended. to those actually in cuttody since the first of January last - By this claufe not one-fourth of those imprisoned for debt will be entitled to receive the benefits, by which means the wretches confined fince the 2d of January may continue to languish years in prison, without producing one fingle advantage to fociety : nay, on the contrary, it is robbed of the benefits. which, might arife from the labours of fuch individuals. What a pity it is, that the laws. of Holland are not adopted, which provides against personal imprisonment of the debtor, and yet contain rigour enough to do the crediror tull justice.

As the inhabitants of Maffachulett's Bay have ever been the first to shew a dislike to England, (though they are the only unmixed breed of the mother country, of all the American Colonies) the following curious circumfrances, dittle known, attended the original foundation of the fettlement : In 1614, the famous Captain John Smyth, accompanied by Captain Thomas Hant, landed in New England, and having taken a particular view of the country, had forme fkirmifhes with fome of the native Indians, called Maffachussetts; but having taken and cured a cargo or two of fith, he left orders with Hunt to proceed to Spain in his ship, with the 6sh taken; and then he fet out for England. But the knavist Hunt, not content with his feeming treafure, and ftimulated by an avaricious delire of gain, took fack iniquitous steps to procure it, as proved of fatal confequence to the infant colony; for as foon as Captain Emyth was departed, he enticed twenty-feven of the innocent Muffachafetts oh hoard, and carried them with his cargo to Malaga, where he fold the poor Indians, at twenty pounds a head. This made the natives break off all communication with a colony founded in treachery; but a party of Presbyterians, who had fled to Holland on account of religion, headed by John Robinson, their Minister, fettled there, and obtained the first charters, in 1624; and in 1625, another party of Independents, headed by White of Dorcheffer, one of their ministers, joined their brethren in New England, and were, one with the other, fo industrious, that in about twenty years they built forty towns, cultivated a large tract of land, and fettled a good trade. A proof to frishmen, that cultivating the advantages of their own foil is all that is wanted to render them a happy people.
