

We are concerned to inform our readers, that the plan projected by the late British Administration, and at first approved of by the present one, of adding another colour or division of the Royal Navy, to be called the Green Division, in honour of Ireland, is totally laid aside. One of the Cabinet, speaking on the subject lately in a large company, said, that the Irish nation were proud enough already, without giving that additional feather to gratify its vanity.

Tuesday a post assembly was held at the Tholsel, for the election of a magistrate, in the room of the late Alderman John Darragh, when Richard Moncrieffe, John Carleton, James Lane, and Samuel Reed, Esqrs. were returned by the Board of Aldermen to the Sheriffs and Commons, in order to choose one of these aforesaid persons to fill that office; but previous to their proceeding to election, Mr. Binns presented a paper to the Sheriffs, which contained the substance of the following resolution: "That it is highly derogatory to the honour, dignity, and independence of the city of Dublin, that any person filling the important office of magistracy, should accept of place, pension, or employment under any Administration, as by such conduct they are obliged to acquiesce with, and servilely to support such measures, as are highly injurious to the real and essential interests of the same." The gentleman then spoke in support of his motion with that perspicuity and constitutional knowledge which have ever characterized him, when any question involving the welfare and advantage of his country came before the public.

Mr. Mulhern seconded the motion, and enforced the propriety and necessity of its adoption at this time, with that pointed eloquence and strength of argument for which this gentleman is ever remarkable, (and, indeed, his patriotic endeavours upon this, as well as every former occasion, must be held in the most grateful remembrance by his fellow citizens) he demonstrated the absolute necessity of appointing such persons to this truly important station, as were absolutely independent; and had also evinced, by the whole tenor of their conduct, that they were really worthy of the choice of their fellow-citizens, and by such means the *old leaven* that had been but too long sown among that *worshipful* Board, must be in a very short period entirely done away. The temporising obsequiousness of many of these *renowned* *scourges* he forcibly alluded to, while he, moreover, paid a merited compliment to some of the present members of the magistracy. The conduct of a certain person of the former description, who had also been intimated himself into public confidence, to be chosen into the Senate of the nation, was severely, but most justly reprobated. In this he omitted nothing that might possibly be to animate his fellow-Commoners to support their true dignity and independence. A desultory conversation afterwards took place, and some futile remarks were made by

#### EXCHANGE.

Sept. 3.—Dublin on London, 7 1/2

Cork, Sept. 1. By Captain Black, of the Mary, from Tortola, we are informed, that between two and three o'clock in the morning of Monday the 11th of July, there was a violent and tremendous shock of an earthquake at Tortola, which continued near half a minute. It was felt with more or less violence in all the adjacent islands, but with little damage. I was lying in bed on board, and the latter part of the shock I was sitting up, and supposed the ship precipitated, with her head quite under. The subterraneous noise, was like rolling and great number of empty casks in a large loft. The report ashore was, it lasted above a minute, several fractures of rocks were precipitated from the mountains, and several houses damaged, but at Spanishtown, the report was, a large part of the Island was severed, and several large fractures of rocks whirled to a considerable distance: there was no uncommon agitation of the sea caused by it; but a strong smell of sulphur, in some particular places immediately followed.

N. B. The 26th August, Captain Black, spoke the Mary, William Stewart, from Waterford to Virginia; and the Hope, John Simms, from Jamaica to Bristol, out eight weeks, lat. 30—long. 14.

Galway, August 25. We hear from Creggs, that on Saturday, the 7th instant, a desperate affray happened there between the people of that place and those of Roscommon, in which four men were killed on the spot, and several dangerously wounded.

Tralee, August 31. This day our assizes ended which proved a maiden one; John O'Donnell and Bartholomew Shea were found guilty of cow stealing, but being recommended as objects of mercy by the Grand Jury, were sentenced to be transported for seven years.
