

There has not one circumstance appeared in the retreat of the Rt. Hon. Edmund Sexton from the chair of the House of Commons, that reflects a higher lustre on his character, than that part of his letter of thanks, wherein he expresses a wish, that the Commons of Ireland may maintain its Independence. Such a wish becomes an Irishman at all times, but at none so particularly as the present, when one attempt to intrench upon that independence has just been so properly defeated, and that the enemy to our constitutional and commercial rights still keeps the field, with an avowed intention of renewing the attack on the first opportunity. It behoves the Commons of Ireland to take the hint this great man has given them; it behoves the people of Ireland to be vigilant, to be "tremblingly alive all o'er," while their dearest interests are in danger: to renew their declarations, and to re-instruct their members on the great occasion.

A fire has happened at the mills of New Haggard, near Trim, by which the mills, with about 700 barrels of wheat and flour were entirely consumed; but we are happy to find the proprietor was fully insured.

A proclamation has been issued by Congress, forbidding all masters of vessels to bring any more indentured servants, either from Great Britain or Ireland, as, for the want of employment, many of those already arrived are in a starving condition, their indentures not being disposed of.

A servant belonging to Mr. Ogilby, merchant in Dorset-street, being left drafts to the amount of 200l. and upwards, in order to discharge some bills that he expected to be called for yesterday in his absence, the fellow went in the mean time to the bank of Sir W. Glendowe and Co. and said his master wanted cash for the same in weight guineas, in the greatest haste imaginable, which was immediately complied with. It has been since discovered that he had a lodging at Drumecondra, where he had a wife and young child, and that he, with his family, set out yesterday at 12 o'clock (which was about an hour after the receipt of the cash) in a coach, and from thence he took he has probably gone either to Drogheda, or otherwise to Rush or Skerries.
