

THIS DAY ARRIVED ONE PACKET,  
LONDON, Sept. 9.

BY an account from a Gentleman just arrived from India, we learn, that appearances of hostilities have given some alarm there. The French refuse to give up Trincomale, and at the time that he sailed, the French standard was hoisted, and they were throwing in considerable quantities of ammunition.

This morning Captain H. of the second regiment of foot guards, went into a gun-smith's shop opposite Bedford-street, in the Strand, and purchased a pair of pistols, one of which he immediately loaded with a ball, turned round, and shot himself through the head, and dropped down dead in the shop.—The occasion of his committing this rash action is said to be his losing last night a capital sum of money at a gaming table.

The King of Prussia's review of his troops in Silesia, which took place on Monday the 29th of last month and the two succeeding days, was one of the most splendid spectacles of military manœuvre and grandeur ever seen on the Continent. Some of the first personages allied to the most powerful and conspicuous Courts in Europe were present. Among others were the following; the Prince Royal of Denmark; Duke of Westgothland, brother to the King of Sweden; Bishop of Osnaburgh and Prince Edward, both sons of our Sovereign; the Emperor of Germany's brother, Duke William Leopold; Prince Henry, and the Prince Royal, heir to the Crown of Prussia; several French, Dutch, Flemish, Italian, Russian, Polish, &c. officers allied to the first Houses. This may be the last military effort of the renowned Frederick.

Lord Cornwallis, Colonel North, Colonel Dundas, Col. Fox, Col. Abercrombie, Major Buttie, Lieut. Colonels England and Murray, Cavalier Grey, Captains Lennox, Camden, Trevelyan and Ramsden, and Lieut. Barry, were among the British Officers at the grand review at Berlin.

A letter from Berlin, of a late date, states, that his Prussian Majesty has, during the last six months, expended 1,000,000 crowns in draining marshes, repairing public buildings, establishing manufactories, settling colonies, relieving distress, and in other purposes of true philanthropy and extensive policy.

The above letter states, that no person whatever is suffered to kneel in the King's presence, when he gives audience, as his Majesty is of opinion that such acts of humiliation should be made to the Deity alone.

The Court of Lisbon seems to hold the commerce of this kingdom in absolute contempt on account of their increasing trade of late years to Russia; but should a commercial treaty be entered into between Great Britain and France, and that Ireland would be included in the same, the Portuguese must very soon experience a material defalcation in the exports of their wines, fruits, and other native commodities, and be very speedily brought to a proper sense of their faithless, ungrateful, and indeed indeed insidious conduct. It has been of late attributed to the encouragement of manufactures in their country, that the demand for the British woollen fabrics has decreased in so extraordinary a manner within the space of a very few years; but notwithstanding the repeated assertions, that a variety of manufactures had been established among them, under the auspices of the Marquis de Pombal, it is well known that they never arrived to maturity, but languished and died away almost in the very infancy of their institution; it has indeed also been held forth as a pretext for the non-admission of Irish woollen fabrics, that a prohibitory edict had been formerly passed in Portugal against admitting woollen goods into any of the ports of that kingdom, but that it was only repealed in favour of England; yet it is notorious to all Europe, that amazing quantities of druggets and cloths are constantly sent thither from France, though no treaty whatever had been at any time entered into for that purpose, and from that nation chiefly are they supplied with such articles. The late Minister tacitly encouraged this faithless and ungenerous proceeding, and the writings of the celebrated Abbe Raynal have since strongly tended to confirm this novel disposition. They receive from these kingdoms such manufactures as they stand most in need of for their luxuries, and the overplus always in ready money; but the more Southerly states of Europe do not stand in need of their wines, and as to Russia, the commutation must be in hard iron, or some such heavy articles, which, perhaps, they will not want in those very large quantities.

We have the pleasure to acquaint the public, that Mr. Crawley is pronounced to be out of danger.
