THIS DAY ARRIVED ONE PACKET LONDON, Sept. 13.

To Y the latest accounts from India we are informed that the detechment of the army fent from Bengal to Madras, during the war to re-inforce the army there, had returned to Calcutta in the beginning of February by land, after an extraordinary march of upwards of two thousand miles, through Golconda, Orixa, and other kingdoms on the west side of the Bay of Bengalt-This route was preferred to the transporting of them by fea, in compliance with the prejudice of the feapoys who have a fuper fittious aversion to the sea. This little army was conducted by Colonel Pearce, and Lieut, Colonels Edmonstone and Blane, who had also diffinguished themselves by their spirited conduct in the war.

Tuefday morning as Lord Sudley was returning from town to Earl Arran's in the Phoenix Park, between one and two o'clock, he was stopped between the Park Gate and the late Bishop of Limerick's house, by four men well mounted, and robbed of his Watch and Purfe, containing some money, and a few foreign gold coins. When the carriage arrived very near home, it was overturned, and Lady Ann Hatton who was with his Lordship, received a wound in the forehead from the broken glafs.

The robbery of Lord Sudley in the Park, was as extraordinary as unprecedented,-The gates of the Park are regularly shut at a certain hour .- The carriage was stopped between one and two o'Clock in the morning, by four men excellently mounted-they all wore long cloaks, and were armed with pittols and fabres -a person on the coach-box snapped a blun derbufs at them, and in return they cut at him with their fabres, which he happily avoided .- The coachman was fo terrified, that after they finished their bufiness, he miltook his way, and drove the carriage over a precipice -the carriage was totally demolished .- Lord Sudley got his writt strained-Lady Hatton was not to fortunate, having her face dreadfully cut with fome of the broken glass.- The coachman was also much bruifed-yet the horfes escaped almost without injury.
