Extract of a letter from a Gentleman in  
Georgia, to his friend in Glasgow, dated  
June 11.

"America, in my opinion, is ripe for another  
revolution, and many people here think it  
is not distant; indeed, you may say, it has al-  
ready begun. The disturbances to the north-  
ward seem to be gaining ground daily; what  
it will end in God knows. The people in gen-  
eral, I do believe, are perfectly wearied of  
their present rulers; in fact, the generality of  
their Assembly-men have not sense enough for  
hog-drivers; many of them before the war  
were never known; the laws they make are  
entirely to serve their own private ends; every  
thing is done here from selfish motives, with-  
out the least view of serving the country.—  
There must be another set of men at the head  
of matters ere this country can do well.

"It is impossible to paint to you the scarcity  
of money here. The States are obliged to  
apply to the British merchants for money to  
send their Members to Congress, otherwise  
they would stay at home. To ask for money  
in payment of any account is at the risk of be-  
ing horsewhipped. Try the law to recover  
them, in this way they can keep you out of  
your money for a couple of years; in short,  
you may sell at any price you please on credit,  
but for cash very little can be done. The laws  
in this state for recovering debts are worse  
than any other, the law-makers themselves  
being too much involved to make laws that  
would operate quickly."

A letter from a gentleman of this city, now  
at Spa, says, that it will be impossible for Eng-  
land to remain neuter as soon as the war im-  
pending in Germany shall break out, the Em-  
peror being determined, if the Court of Lon-  
don doth not join in the grand alliance, to  
enter and take possession of all the hereditary  
dominions of his Britannic Majesty in Saxony  
and Westphalia.

A gentleman who came a passenger in a ship  
from Bourdeaux, that arrived here yesterday,  
confirms the account that a strong Squadron of  
French ships of war, sailed the first of this  
month from Brest on a secret expedition.

Monday night last, a Portuguese gentleman  
was assaulted by several ruffians between the  
end of Lazor's-hill and the little bridge lead-  
ing to the Low Ground, whom, notwithstanding  
the total inequality, he resisted, and by an  
accurate skill in fencing, kept the villains at  
bay, for above half an hour; when, finding  
they could make no impression on so great a  
master of the small sword, they voluntary  
gave up their design, and fled with the utmost  
precipitation across a large field just opposite  
the Artichoke.

We hope, however, that human nature is not  
yet so depraved, as to render such examples  
common.—but it is not enough that death  
seems to be little regarded by the generality of  
our malefactors. Policy, as well as humanity,  
should therefore devise some new and striking  
punishment, which, while it spares the life of  
an unhappy wretch, renders him a permanent  
example of misery, more dreadful to a de-  
praved and sensual imagination, than a thou-  
sand speedy deaths.

We hear the person suspected of committing  
the inhuman murder near Chapelizod, was an  
intimate acquaintance of the deceased; know-  
ing that the unfortunate young man's mother  
had a property of some consequence he pro-  
posed courtship, which being rejected, and  
supposing the opposition originated with the  
son, he took this dreadful step to remove the  
bar to his expectations. He accompanied the  
distressed woman in search of her child, and  
when the body was discovered she turned to  
him and charged him with the murder, which  
he immediately acknowledged, then leaped  
over the ditch and escaped.

A gentleman just arrived from Bourdeaux,  
relates, that on the 15th August, in his pas-  
sage from Martinico to that place, the body of  
a man was seen floating about fifty yards from  
the vessel. The Captain immediately ordered  
out the boat and four hands, who soon brought  
the seeming dead carcass on board; but what  
was their surprise on finding the unhappy per-  
son breathe, and manifest every symptom of  
returning sense and life. The Surgeon bleed  
him, and chased his temples with volatile spi-  
rits, and in less than half an hour he opened  
his eyes, and exclaimed in the English tongue,  
O Lord! where am I? On taking off his  
cloaths, in order to put him to bed, a cork  
jacket, with a sort of trousers of the same  
were discovered. The next day, being a  
good deal recovered, the miserable man told  
them, that he sailed from the port of Salem in  
New England, in a brig bound for Madeira,  
and that about three days before, they were  
attacked by a Saletine rover, who boarded  
and took them; that pretending to be lame,  
he was neglected by the Moors, and about ele-  
ven at night, took an opportunity of slipping  
on his cork apparatus, and let himself down as  
easy as possible from the fore chains, totally  
unobserved: That he floated some distance,  
and then pushed himself on with his hands,  
willing to perish in the water, rather than be  
carried into slavery. In this condition, some-  
times on his back, and sometimes on his belly,  
he drove about the ocean, and at last sunk into  
a kind of trance, in which state he was when  
discovered by the French ship. On their ar-  
rival at Bourdeaux, the Chamber of Commerce  
presented their brave American with a purse of  
three hundred crowns, and he is now waiting  
an opportunity of returning in the packet,  
which sails from Port L'Orient to New-York  
every month.
