" America, in my opinion, is ripe for another revolution, and many people here think it is not diffant; indeed, you may fay, it has already begun. The diffurbances to the northward feem to be gaining ground daily; what it will end in God knows. The people in general, I do believe, are perfectly wearied of their present rulers; in fall, the generality of their Affembly-men have not fense enough for hog-drivers, many of them before the war were never known; the laws they make are entirely to ferve their own private ends; every thing is done here from felvish motives, without the least view of ferving the country -There must be another set of men at the head of matters ere this country can do well.

" It is impossible to paint to you the fearcity of money here. The States are obliged to apply to the British merchants for money to fend their Members to Congress, otherwise they would stay at home. To ask for money in payment of any account is at the risk of being horfewhipped. Try the law to recover them, in this way they can keep you out of your money for a couple of years; in thort, you may fell at any price you pleafe on credit. but for cafe very little can be done. The laws in this flate for recovering debts are worle than any other, the law-makers themselves being too much involved to make laws that

would operate quickly."
