

Cork, Oct. 3. Hugh Lawler and John Burke, who were to be executed on Saturday last, received a respite on Friday at 2 o'Clock.

Extract of a letter from Galway. "I believe you have heard of a horrid murder that was committed the 7th of Oct last, at the Fair of Ballinacree, on a young Gentleman of this County, named Patrick Bellew. You might have seen the Proclamation of this in the public papers, and the great rewards that were offered by Government, and the chief of all the Gentlemen of this County, for apprehending the perpetrators, amounting to the sum of two thousand pounds. However, no discovery was made until the following February, when the body-servant of the deceased, and an accomplice, discovered the whole transaction, whence it appears, that the murder was committed in a stable at Ballinacree, about the hour of ten o'Clock at night, by the hostler of the stable, and three accomplices, exclusive of the servant, all neighbours, tenants, or former servants of the deceased. What compelled the treacherous servant to make the discovery was an attempt he made, and which he had almost effected, to poison the whole family of Mr. Bellew, by arsenick, infused into a kettle of water that was intended for breakfast, but a speedy and providential aid of a Physician, who happened to be at hand, prevented the fatal operation. The cruel servant being taken, hereupon confessed the whole work of darkness. The murderers were immediately apprehended and lodged in this County Gaol, arraigned last Assizes, and their trial put off to this, when they were found guilty upon as clear an evidence as ever appeared for the dark crime of murder, and ordered to be hanged, beheaded, quartered, and their bowels cut out and burned next Monday, at the usual place of execution here, but their heads to be carried to Ballinacree, there to be fixed on iron screw spikes for public view and example. The villain still persists in declaring their innocence."

Last Friday and Saturday seventeen convicts were carried down to Cove, in order to be put on board a transport now lying there, for the Coast of Africa.

Last night Mrs. Whitney, widow of Mr. Richard Whitney, coming out of Hugh's lane on the Coal quay, missed her way, stepped into the Dock, and was unfortunately drowned.
