May it please your Grace,
WE his Majesty's most loyal and dutiful
Subjects, the Merchants of the City of Limerick,
humbly beg leave to approach your Grace,
with our sincerest congratulations on your ar-
rival in this City.

In your Grace's progress, through this Pro-
vince, you will receive such unequivocal marks
of loyalty to our Sovereign, and affection in
your Grace's Person and Government, as can
leave no doubt of our wishes to be united to
our Sister Kingdom, by the most indissoluble
Ties.

With these sentiments, permit us to approach
your Grace, and to unite with our fellow
Citizens in the approbation of your firm and
prudent administration, conscious that to your
Wisdom and Protection, we owe the suppression
of those illicit practices, which had almost
annihilated our Commerce.

such a system as will Constitutionally and Com-
mercially unite the two Countries.

Thus will your Grace in the Prosperity and
Acclamation of a grateful Nation, erect a
lasting monument to your Glory.

We ardently Pray that your Grace after the
most sensible marks of Public Approbation,
and the more flattering Testimony of your own
Heart, may long enjoy, with your amiable
Consort, every Felicity that domestic enjoy-
ment can bestow.
