May it please your Grace,

WE, the Bishop and Clergy of the diocese of Waterford, being equally honoured and gratified in being permitted to approach your Grace with this testimony of our duty and respect. Teachers of a religion which breathes a remarkable spirit of loyalty to the King and of subjection to those who are vested with legal authority, it is peculiarly incumbent on us studiously to evidence our firm allegiance to his Majesty, and our profound honour for an illustrious Chief Governor to whom our Sovereign has wisely delegated the distinguished office of presiding over this kingdom.

It is also matter of a mere falsehood to us, that your Grace has been pleased not only to visit this city, famous for its ancient and invisible attachment to the Crown of England and for the eminent commercial advantages which its situation befriends, but also to honour with your presence many other important parts of this country; strongly persuading that the more your Grace's virtues are known, the larger will be your tribute of public estimation; and that the more your Grace becomes acquainted with the State and circumstances of the kingdom which now experiences the benefits of your administration, the greater will be your present and future ability and earnestness to promote its welfare.

To which his Grace was pleased to give a most courteous answer, expressing the highest respect for that venerable body, and assuring them of the constant support, and (what he was every since late circumstances obliged to add) the protection of his government.
