miser prouging mimlest to one thing, he did another. The fact was this, and it was upon record beyond the power of contradiction. The confequence was, that the bill pailed in form without reading; but when it was produced in Ireland, it was a thing quite different from the refolutions, and bound each country in a reciprocal manner, the one to the other. There undoubtedly was a breach of faith, a breach of honour, a forfeiture of promife in the Minister, a bold, an unprecedented infult to the Commons of Great Hritain, unparalleled in any former felhons of Parliament. It was a scheme to delude, to blindfold the Houle, and it deferved to meet with every mark of refentment.
