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-auquility was only fufwy a thread, Ireland should endeavour to reduce that debt, which in case of war would render her fituation irkfome, if called upon for her share of expence; he would therefore support the resolution.

Sir E Newenham declared himself of the opinion. The Accomptant General (Mr. Burgh) faid the parliamentary grants amounted to the present debt of the nation; and as the country improved their premiums might increase. The furplus of the loan was 78,000l. from which favings a finking fund might be formed in order to pay off the debt. -He thought it was better to continue the present taxes He would therefore vote against

the motion. Mr. Brownlow thought the two resolutions proposed by his Right Hon. Friend, extremely necessary, and if the fecond was not admitted, the first was nugatory. The accumulation of taxes would eventually deftroy the trade and manufacture of the nation. There was nothing in the relolation, in his opinion, which milirated against the present Administration : but if they did not agree to the prefent refolution. the matter would be left open to a future Administration for the purposes of venality and corruption. Every friend to Ireland, every lover of his country must rate for the refolu-

Mr. Griffith observed, that the resolutions did not arise as the motion of party! It was supporting the property of the country, and every man who possessed a property should supportic, as it went to form a barrier against the prodigality of Administration.-Gentlemen on the other fide of the House admitted of the principle of the refolution; but why did they not point out how far their prodigality would go to carry their principle into effect? From the very arguments urged by an Hon, Gentleman (the Accomptant General) he thought he fhould vote for the motion, as was his own intention.

Mr. Monck Maion opposed the motion, as its principle went to tie up the hands of Parliament for granting bounties, and it was his opinion that bounties should be extensive, and not bound to any particular branch only; the filheries, and other great national objects demanded as much encouragement as manufacture. He knew it to be the intention of Government to reduce the national expences, and relying upon that principle, he would vote against the

Mr. Forbes dwelt upon the intention of voteing 140 dool, taxes last fellion. This vote was given, not as a dependance that the country sould bear the burden, but from the lure held out of the great benefits which were to follow in the celebrated propolitions-propolitions gone to a country from whole bourn no travel-

He then produced the charts of the national expence, prepared by Mr. James Corry fto whose abilities he bore honourable testimony) that exhibit at one view the flate of the national debts and credits for fome years pall; and after tharply remarking on the alacrity of the Irish to accumulate debt, he said they were called upon to grant new taxes, when they are totally inadequate, without the Secretary even promiting an equalization, for on a former day he faid he was not in the Irish Government, he could not answer for the conduct of Parliament. He faid that nothing had been offered by the other fide to fatisfy even appearances; for if a reduction is proposed in the civil lift, the answer will be, that there it is impossible; if the military, we shall be told a war is not diffant, so that in the civil and mi litary establishments nothing is to be expected either in peace or war for a reduction. He would advise less confidence in the number of ministerial troops; and then proceeded to elucidate his argument by a flory of Mr. Townthend, when Secretary at War, who could find no answer to certain petitions in either war or peace, as they both were repugnant to the purpoles of acceding to retrenchment; fo that here between gratitude in war, and acquiefcence in peace, there was to be no end of our expences; he then declared his full intention of supporting the Resolutions.

Sir Hercules Langrithe admitted the nature of the motion to be incontrovertible; the first refolution implied the whole of the fecond; confequently the fecond was ufelels-In regard to the Propositions, he would fay of them Re-QUIESCANT IN PACE; but he would also fay, IN FERINA RESURRECTIONIS, and if they should rife, there certainly would be a Day of Judgment, and he would then call

aloud on Tully's Name, And bid the Father of the People hail!

Mr. Corry spoke after Sir Hercules Lan-

grime, for the resolutions.

He was followed by Mr. Grattan, in a speech which lasted an hour and a quarter, also for
