

the duty on the importation of foreign herrings was to be continue at ten shillings the barrel. In support of the petition he went over pretty much the same ground that he did the night before, and concluded with saying, that from the manner in which the petition was drawn up, he did not think it would militate against parliamentary rule, if it was received.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer admitted that the petition was guardedly and well drawn up, but still its principle was against a tax, and from that consideration, in his opinion, it ought not to be received.

Mr. Chatterton said, that he would vote for receiving the petition: he contended that the complaints of the merchants and traders of a city of such commercial consequence as Cork was, demanded the attention of Parliament.

Mr. Browne of the College spoke likewise, for receiving the petition, he said the prayer of it was by no means unreasonable; it did not go to a prohibition, it prayed only for a regulation.

Mr. Corry said the conduct of Administration, in respect to petitions against grievances complained of, was by no means satisfactory to him: he had offered a petition to the House the other day, which was refused. Are the people to be shut out for ever, from approaching in Parliament with their complaints; it was a subject which he would bring forward, in order to have that point settled.

Sir Lucius O'Brien declared the parliamentary usage to be—that petitions against laying on taxes were not to be received, as the public business might be thereby impeded. But petitions for regulations in matters of trade, or the modification of a tax, might be consistently received without departing from parliamentary rule.

The Secretary of State coincided in opinion with the Hon. Member who spoke last, with respect to the order of Parliament, and said, that the petition now offered, came strictly within the description of one that might be received. He by no means wished to infringe on the order laid down by the House; but he wanted to lay before them information on a subject, which materially affected the commercial interest of the city which he had the honour to represent.

Mr. Brownlow said he would never rest satisfied, till the point respecting receiving petitions was settled;—are we to debar the people from complaining of their grievances;—there was a petition offered to the House a few days ago from the Printers, it only prayed for a modification of a tax, but it was refused! for his part, he would ever be for listening and attending to the complaints of the people.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer begged leave to inform the gentlemen, that there was no question before the House, and that a great deal of time was lost in speaking about matters not regularly before them, and in order to bring on the business of the nation, he would move the order of the day.

Kilkenny, Feb. 15. Next morning he was conducted from Durrow to his old lodgings in Maryborough gaol, by Captain Bathorn and a party of the Durrow Volunteers.
