approve of the clause; he said a compromise had been offered by the corporation of the city of Limerick, and which they were ready to abide by.

Mr. Boyd was of opinion that the clause was unnecessary, for if any persons thought themselves injured by the erecting of weirs, they might bring their complaint into a court of law, and there have the question properly discussed.

Mr. Ogle spoke against the clause;—he said the mischief did not arise from the erecting of weirs but from the fishermen destroying the spawn, and there were already sufficient laws in force to punish delinquents in said cases, and he hoped the right hon. gentleman would withdraw his clause.

The Attorney General then withdrew the clause, and he moved another to the same purport, but instead of making it general, he confined it to operate only to the river Shannon near Limerick.

Lord Luttrell objected to this clause, on the ground that it was not a general one; he wished the operation of it should extend to the river Liffey, for if some such clause was not passed, there would not be a salmon in the river Liffey, in a very few years. He likewise observed, that it had been said, it was much better to leave this question to a determination of a court of law, but this clause would be a means of preventing litigious law-suits.

Mr. George Ponsonby said, that this clause would make the legislature overleap its bounds, and that it tended to invade private property, without making compensation, and of course to the manifest injury of proprietors. In his opinion, the way to proceed in cases of erecting weirs on rivers, was not by way of act of Parliament, but by way of actions at law.

Mr. Chatterton coincided in opinion, and said it was hard to attack the charters of a corporation, that held the right unviolated for near two hundred years.

Mr. Bushe spoke in favour of the clause; he said that Parliament had a right to interfere on all occasions, where persons thought themselves aggrieved.

The Secretary of State, Mr. Mason, and Sir John Blaquiere declared, they would vote for the reception of the clause; at the same time, they would not bind themselves to support it, except it met with their approbation.

Mr. William Ponsonby spoke against the reception of the clause.

On the question being put for agreeing to the clause, it was negatived without a division.

On Sir Henry Hartington's remarking, that an order for going into a committee on the Limerick jail bill, which stood for this day, was not proceeded on.

The Speaker observed that the purport of the bill, differed very materially from the title, for the title was a bill for building and repairing a jail in the city of Limerick; the tendency of it was, to enable the Dean of Limerick to take a new house.

Friday, March 15.

Attorney General moved for leave to bring in a bill for improving the police of the city of Dublin, and for repealing an act of the 17th year of his present Majesty's reign, for the better police of Dublin.—Leave granted.

House then sat in committee on the freeholders registry bill.—Reported progress.

The House adjourned to next day.

Letters from London, say, that the petition for Seaford had gone against Mr. Flood, who by these means is disappointed of a seat in the British House of Commons.

By the last accounts from Bombay, we learn, that the Dutch have entirely monopolized the salt works at Turocoryn, Java, Ceylon, Malacca, &c. They have lately erected forts round most part of the coast of Ceylon. The company has established many fences and out posts in the interior part of the island, which, since the conclusion of the last peace, are much increased, as the limits of their possessions were then greatly extended. However improbable it may appear, our correspondent declares, their works in the month of June last formed a circuit of more than 160 miles, which has occasioned a contention between them and the Emperor of Candia, not likely to be determined for some time.

To the honour of British hospitality be it told, that when Rodney had conquered De Grasse, the gallant tar gave his brave prisoners a single dinner at the best tavern in Jamaica, which cost, including wine, ELEVEN HUNDRED POUNDS.

Clonmel, March 16. In consequence of the nocturnal meetings of the white-boys, so frequent at Urlingford, and those parts of the county of Tipperary, adjacent thereto, leading to Killenaul, Cashel and Charles, a number of gentlemen inhabitants of the parishes of Mackaka and Barros, on an application of Robert Ryves, esq; a magistrate of that neighbourhood, did on the night of Sunday the 12th of March instant, march towards their usual place of meeting, and being directed by the sounding of their horns, advanced towards Longford pass near to which they came up, between the hours of twelve and one o'clock with a body of them, mounted, armed &c. and on desiring them to surrender they fired, and providently no further damage ensued than lodging some lugs in some of the horses, and on endeavouring to make their escape they were fired upon when five were killed, several wounded, and their Captain James Cody, in his uniform and one Thomas Barley, both inhabitants of Urlingford near Kilkool were made prisoners, and who were on the 14th instant escorted and lodged in the gaol of Clonmel, by the aforesaid gentlemen. This spirited exertion of a few, shew how easy it would be for men of property in the neighbourhood, immediately where these miscreants take their rise, to curb their proceedings, would they only use that timely exertion with which they are armed by the laws of their country, as magistrates independent of their friends and connections. The few gentlemen who embarked on this excursion, exceedingly regret the meeting having happened in the midst of the bog of Allen, into which those wretches flew for protection off their horses and off the high road, immediately after the first fire and under cover of the night, otherwise a better account would have been given of them.

Cork, March 16. Yesterday a ship at one of our quays being stowed with brimstone for the destruction of a great number of rats that inhabited therein, two of the crew forgetting what had been done, went on board

the Munster-mail, which was robbed near Naas on Tuesday, was found near that town, on Friday last, and it is said the contents are safe. Two men are also mentioned to have been apprehended on suspicion of stopping the cart. On Friday last the 17th inst. was shot on the Shannon, between the Bishop's Palace, and Colonel Lefroy's, a beautiful and uncommon fowl, called the Greater Crested Grebe; this elegant bird is almost peculiar to the Lake of Geneva, where Muffs and Tippetts of its feathers commonly sell for ten guineas: It is not in Dr. Browne's catalogue of the birds of Ireland, nor was it ever publicly noticed in this kingdom before. It is stuffed and now in the Museum of Ralph Ousley, Esq.

Next Wednesday and Thursday six troops of the 18th Dragoons, commanded by that worthy and active Officer, Col. Cuffe, will march in to be quartered here.

Last night the Hon. Mr. Justice Kelly and Sir Samuel Bradstreet, Bart. arrived here and this morning opened their respective Courts, when the County and City Grand Juries were sworn.
