The Right Hon. Secretary of State presented a bill for the protection of the persons, houses, and properties of Rectors, Vicars, and Curates, actually resident in their respective parishes.—Read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

A message from the Lords by the two masters in Chancery, acquainting the House that their Lordships had agreed, without amendment, to the Partnership bill; that they had agreed to the amendment made by this House in the bill to settle the provisions in Jane Bonnell's bill; and lastly, returned the Paving Bill, in which they had made an amendment by expunging the clause which relates to persons summoned before the Directors and Commissioners.

The Speaker rose, and gave it as his opinion, that as this bill related to a tax, it was inconsistent with the privileges of the House of Commons to enter into any consideration of the said amendment made by the other House.

The A. Gen. corroborated what the Speaker had said, and after a few observations, declared he did his duty in moving. That the consideration of this amendment be postponed to the first of July.

The Right Hon. Secretary of State moved for leave to bring in a bill to regulate presentments made by Grand Juries, for compensation between clerks of the Crown and Peace for the fees of prisoners.—Leave being granted, he presented the bill, which was also read a first time and ordered to be read a second to-morrow.

The order of the day being read for resolving into Committee on the bill for encouraging and rendering effectual the Inland Navigations.

Right Hon. Mr. Secretary Orde said, that one of the purposes of this bill was for granting 4000l. to the Grand Canal Company, whose claim he thought had not been stated in a manner sufficiently clear, to authorize as yet the granting of this sum, and there were other perplexities in the bill that he thought made its passing this session inexpedient.

Mr. Griffith defended the Grand Canal Company whose claim had been considered in a full Committee of the whole House, and a report agreed to accordingly: He conjured the House to reflect that if its faith was thus broke, no set of men hereafter would be induced to prosecute any work with the hope of assistance.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer followed Mr. Orde and moved, That the order be discharged and the bill withdrawn, both which motions were agreed to.

Mr. Corry gave notice that he should, on Saturday next, resume the East India business.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer presented a bill to make sub-constables more useful.—Read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

The inland fishery bill was reported.

Friday, March 31.

The bill for the protection of the persons, houses and properties of Rectors, Vicars and Curates resident in their respective parishes, read a second time. When the question for its committal being put,

Lord Luttrell expressed a wish that the House should, while it thus protected the clergy, find a method to induce them to practise more moderation towards the people, on whom their exertions were so great, that he was credibly informed the enormous 17th 28s. per acre was levied on potatoes in a part of the kingdom.

Mr. Ogle defended the bill on the principle of necessity.

Mr. Montgomery, of Donegal, declared that the extortions of the clergy had driven one hundred thousand of the inhabitants of Ireland out of the kingdom.

Extract of a letter from Castlebar, March 20.
"As to Mr. Fitzgerald, you may be assured he is not dead, nor likely to die; on the contrary, he is mending every day. Such a wreck as was made of his house is almost beyond credulity; its ruins would give one an idea of the destruction of Troy—He values his lots at twelve thousand pounds."

On the 17th day of January last died, upon the coast of Africa, Edward Thompson, Esq; Commander of the Grampus, and Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Squadron on the Coast of Africa.

It is the determined purpose of Administration, to prosecute with vigour and effect, all those concerned in the late most atrocious outrages in the county Mayo. The Attorney General in person attends the assizes—Fitzgerald must shew good cause, indeed, if he is allowed to put off his trial. The half faced gentlemen, who forced into the prison, and made the attack on the life of a prisoner confined there for a crime shocking to humanity, will have to shew very good cause truly, why they should not also be dealt with according to law.—The peace of this country never will be effectually established, until the populace are convinced, that the law knows no distinction of persons—that the ruffian in a laced coat and ruffles, is as liable to be hanged for a murder or a rape, as the hero of a hurling match.

Cork, March 30. Last Saturday night from 11 to 3 on Sunday morning, a great number of those deluded wretches called White Boys, assembled in the parish of Ballymartie, entered several houses, from whence they took fire-arms and horses, and obliged many to swear that they would administer oaths the next day to the different parishioners not to pay more tythes than 4s. for potatoes, wheat and barley, 1s. 6d. oats and meadow 1s. per acre, and their usual stipend to the Romish Clergy, for marriages, &c. And on Sunday morning two notices to some purpose were posted on the Chapel Gate of Ballymartie, and directions therein that the names of such as would not swear should be posted in Blarney for Captain Lightfoot's inspection, which were pulled down by a young Gentleman.

Extract of a letter from Cadix, to a Gentleman in Youghall, dated the 17th ult.

"The Sangedro de Alcantara, a Spanish man of war and register ship from Lima, was on the night of the 2d Feb. totally wrecked in the bay of Penichio, 40 miles north of Lisbon. She had on board eight millions of hard dollars in specie, besides copper and products, amounting all together to the enormous sum of about fourteen millions of current dollars; she run on rocks surrounded with ten fathom water, with all her sails set, and in a moment was dashed to pieces. To add to this misfortune, one hundred and eighty souls perished, amongst whom was a Mr. Hugh O'Falvey, from near Cork, who had acquired a considerable property in South America, and was coming home to his family, which had arrived lately from the same part of the world. There are great hopes of the treasure and copper being saved; to effect which the Tribunal of the Consulado, have through the medium of the British Consul in this city, applied to the Messrs. Brathwaths, famous divers, who have
