We likewife hear that a proper reprefentation of this matter has been made to the Lords of the Admiralty, by the Captain of one of our cruizers, who undoubtedly thought it, as every one muft, very extraordinary that the French fhould be fuffered to effablish an extensive fifthery at the very mouths of our harbours. It is to be hoped that this will have the defired effect, and that the fiftheries on our coaft will be thought to be deferving of protection, not only becaufe if protected they will be a fource of great wealth, but which is of ftill more confequence, becaufe they will form the beft nurfery for feamen for the British navy.

Laft Saturday Edward Hourahan, for the murder of William Je kfon, in this County, was hanged and quartered at Gallows Green, purfuant to his fentence. He confeffed his crime, but that the deed was the effect of paffion after having been beaten by faid Jackfon the day before, as well as the fame day of his killing him.

Same day, Thomas and William Nokes, brothers, Dennis Regan and Thomas Leby, were executed for burglarioufly entering with other perfons, the houfe of Giles Powell, Efg; at Sunday's Well, cutting, wounding, and robbing him of 1751. 3s. 6d. a gold watch, and feveral articles of plate. The three first in the most folemn manner, at the moment of launching into eternity, declared their innocence, and Lehy alfo declared he was no farther concerned than being alked to be of the party, which he declined, but drinking with fome of them the next day, was fufpected, on which he and Regan gave themfelves up the ay after the robbery. They all behaved with n uncommon degree of refignation, and died rgiving all mankind,
