

formed that a fleet of French vessels have been for some time past fishing for mackrel, between Baltimore and Crookhaven, and that each vessel has about 30 men, and a string of nets which reach about two miles, so that it is scarce possible for any shoal of fish to pass them, by which means our poor fishermen are obliged to be satisfied with the few straggling fish which happen to escape them.

We likewise hear that a proper representation of this matter has been made to the Lords of the Admiralty, by the Captain of one of our cruizers, who undoubtedly thought it, as every one must, very extraordinary that the French should be suffered to establish an extensive fishery at the very mouths of our harbours. It is to be hoped that this will have the desired effect, and that the fisheries on our coast will be thought to be deserving of protection, not only because if protected they will be a source of great wealth, but which is of still more consequence, because they will form the best nursery for seamen for the British navy.

Last Saturday Edward Hourahan, for the murder of William Jackson, in this County, was hanged and quartered at Gallows Green, pursuant to his sentence. He confessed his crime, but that the deed was the effect of passion after having been beaten by said Jackson the day before, as well as the same day of his killing him.

Same day, Thomas and William Nokes, brothers, Dennis Regan and Thomas Lehy, were executed for burglariously entering with other persons, the house of Giles Powell, Esq; at Sunday's Well, cutting, wounding, and robbing him of 175l. 3s. 6d. a gold watch, and several articles of plate. The three first in the most solemn manner, at the moment of launching into eternity, declared their innocence, and Lehy also declared he was no farther concerned than being asked to be of the party, which he declined, but drinking with some of them the next day, was suspected, on which he and Regan gave themselves up the day after the robbery. They all behaved with an uncommon degree of resignation, and died forgiving all mankind.

Public executions seem to be of little use to the profligate, for while a Gentleman was viewing the corpse of one of the above young men, he found a boy's hand in his pocket, for which he gave him a good drubbing. A celebrated Master Cobler of this city, as remarkable for his conviviality as his wit, returned to his house a few nights ago, after having taken his evening's malt, and found, to his astonishment, his wife, Lady Arden, dressed out in a false bum and merry countenance. Tom, provoked at her appearance, immediately commenced with Ballyhooley, the name of a *Baculum*, and laid it on in such a manner, that my lady's cries having alarmed the neighbours, they rushed in; upon which my lady said "my dear friends be not alarmed, I am only kicking up a rumpus."
