Abstract of an Act to prevent tumultuous Risings of Persons within this Kingdom.

From the 1st of May, 1766, if any Persons, to the Number of five, or more, shall by Night, assault, injure, or maltreat any person or persons, by wounding, beating, tying, or other act of cruelty, whereby the life or limb of the person assaulted may be in danger; or shall wilfully destroy or injure his, her, or their property, by killing, maiming, or worrying their Cattle, or by destroying or spoiling their houses, barns, mills, or mill-dams, hay, corn, potatoes, whether in the field or haggard, or maliciously digging up ground. All and every person or persons so offending, and being thereof found guilty, shall suffer death, as in cases of Felony, without benefit of Clergy.

If any persons in number as above, shall commit any of the above offences in the day time, he and they shall on conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony, and the court shall have power to transport such Felons.

Upon notice given to the high constable of the Barony where the offences shall be committed, as in the case of robbery petitions, if the inhabitants of the adjoining towns, &c. shall not apprehend the Offenders, or some or one of them, or shall not discover, and give an examination to a justice of Peace against one or more of them, the person or persons injured shall be intitled to satisfaction for the loss, to be presented and raised on the County at large, or upon any Barony of the County, at the discretion of the Grand Jury.

Any person or persons who shall break open any Prison with an intention to enlarge any prisoner, or prisoners, and shall be found guilty thereof, shall suffer death, as in cases of Felony, without benefit of Clergy, and may be tried before the trial or attainder of the person or persons so enlarged.

Every person who shall rescue any person committed by a justice of Peace on a mittimus, for Treason or Felony, from a constable, &c. before the person committed shall be lodged in jail, shall, on conviction, suffer death, as in cases of Felony, without benefit of Clergy.

Every person or persons who shall by force, violence, or menaces, impose or tender any Oath or solemn Engagement on any person or persons, to compel or engage him, her, or them to commit or conceal any unlawful act, shall, on conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony, without benefit of clergy.

Every Justice of the Peace shall have power to summon and examine any person or persons, within his jurisdiction, whom he shall suspect to have taken such illegal Oaths, and upon refusal to be examined, to commit such person or persons to the county jail, for any time not exceeding six months.

“And be it enacted by the Authority afore-said, That it shall and may be lawful for every Justice of the Peace, Sheriff, Under-Sheriff, Mayor, Bailiff, or other Peace Officer, within the Limits of his or their respective Jurisdictions, taking with them the necessary Assistance, (and they are hereby impowered and authorized to command all His Majesty's subjects of Age and Ability to be assisting therein) to apprehend, disperse, resist, and oppose all Persons concerned in any unlawful Acts before mentioned in this Act; and if any Person or Persons shall happen to be killed, maimed, or hurt, in the apprehending, dispersing, resisting, or opposing any such Offenders, then every such Justice of the Peace, Sheriff, or other Peace Officer, and all and singular Persons being aiding and assisting to them, or any of them, shall be freed, discharged, and indemnified, as well against the King's Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, as against all and every other Person or Persons, or for or concerning the killing, maiming, or hurting, any such Persons.”

RESOLVED, That the Gentlemen who compose this Meeting, do pledge themselves to each other, and the publick, that they will use every effort in their power to bring the present disturbers of the Publick Peace to Justice. — And they will exert their influence to prevent any of their Tenants or Dependants from joining or assisting the Insurgents; and if they are found to offend herein, will be the first to bring them to Public Punishment.
