From the 1st of May, 1765, if any Persons, to the Number of five, or more, shall by Night, affault, injure, or maltreat any person or perions, by wounding, beating, tying, or other act of cruelty, whereby the life or limb of the person assaulted may be in danger; or shall wilfully dettroy or injure his, her, or their property, by killing, maining, or worrying their Cattle, or by dellroying or spoiling their houses, barns, mills, or mill-dams, hay, corn, potatoes, whether in the field or haggard, or maliciously digging up ground. All and every person or persons so offending, and being thereof found guilty, shall fuffer death, as in cases of Felony, without benefit of Clergy
