At a numerous Meeting of the Gentlemen,
Clergy and Freeholders of the County of Lime-
rick this day met, pursuant to Publick Notice
from the HIGH SHERIFF at Bruff, on Tues-
day 6th June, 1786.

The HIGH SHERIFF in the Chair.

The following Resolutions were entered into
unanimously.

RESOLVED that the present tumultuous ris-
ings by night or by day of large bodies of
the lower order of the people, in arms or other-
wise under any pretence however specious or
plausible of redressing a grievance is a daring and
flagrant violation of the laws of this country, and
of most alarming tendency to the community, and
that every person who has the least regard for the
peace of this country, his family or property,
ought immediately to use every exertion in his
power, for the Suppression of these tumults; and
more particularly for the Interest of these deluded
persons, who by their misconduct take the most
effectual Means of preventing a possibility of
Inquiry in Parliament as to their alleged grie-
vances.

RESOLVED, That the present situation of
affairs in this county lays us under the painful
Necessity of uniting while these disturbances pre-
vail, in the execution of the White Boy act in the
utmost Strictness.

RESOLVED, That we do recommend to the
Magistrates residing in each parish in this county
to call upon the principal Inhabitants thereof to
form an armed Association for the purpose of
co-operating with the neighbouring parishes, in
quieting these disturbances and we do hereby
pledge ourselves to attend when called on.

RESOLVED, That the Gentlemen who com-
pose this meeting do pledge themselves to each
other and the Publick, that they will use every
effort in their power to bring the present distur-
bers of the Publick peace to Justice, and that they
will exert their influence with their Tenants and
Dependents to prevent their joining or assisting
the Insurgents, and if they shall find them offend-
ing in those particulars they will themselves be
the foremost to bring them to Publick Punishment.

RESOLVED, That as we have received in-
telligence that a party of these Insurgents have
threatened to appear at Murroe on Sunday next,
we earnestly entreat the attendance of such Gen-
tlemen as wish to carry their Resolutions into
effect at said place at Eleven o'clock in the fore-
noon precisely on that day, well armed with one
attendant at least in arms.

RESOLVED, That as we are determined to
carry the Laws into execution against all persons
offending by tumultuous or armed meetings, and
combinations, so we will to the utmost of our
power protect by every legal means any of our
Tenants or poor Neighbours who may be op-
pressed by any persons whatsoever, provided they
immediately desert from such unlawful combina-
tions and meetings.

RESOLVED, That this meeting be and is
hereby adjourned to Murroe in this County, to
meet at Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, on
Sunday next.

RESOLVED, Nem. Con. that the thanks of
this Meeting be given to the High Sheriff, for
his polite, upright, and impartial Conduct in the
Chair, and for his readiness to comply with the
Requisition of the Freeholders.
