The Court therefore postponed passing judgment until the principals were convicted.

Mr. Stanley declared, that the more he revolved the trial of Mr. Firzgerald in his mind, the more he was convinced that the trial was irregular; and that he would shew it if the facts were on the record; but without that, it was impossible to fustain any motion in arrest of judgment. He faid, he had no doubt but Mr. Firzgerald was fafe in their Lordships hands, and that if any advantages could be derived from the nicety or caution of the law, he was fure their Lordships would feel it as much their inclination as it was their duty to give the unfortunate gentleman the full benefit of those advantages.

The Court with great humanity, declared they wished that Mr. Attorney General had confented to discharge the Jury, as that would have removed all doubt. The Court threw it out in the beginning, as an expedient, which they submitted to the Attorney General, but as be bad not thought fit to confent, the Court could do nothing new; but Mr. Baron Power declared, he thought procuring a murder, was a diffinct substantive, and independent act of

treaton.

The Chief Baron then addressed Mr. Fitzgerald and faid, he was forry to fay, after a very tedious trial, in which Mr. Fitzgerald had the affiftance of very able council, he was found guilty of a most horrid murder, and that he must then pass the sentence of the law, which he accordingly did; and he was executed at 8 o'clock that evening.
