Their loyalty to King George III. has been often proved in fighting his battles, and their gratitude to government has been often expreffed, for giving them liberty of religious worthip, and to take long leafes ; what remains to make their lives in fome finall degree comfortable, we hope will be effected by a PATRIOT KING, and a wife and good government.
