

Extract of a letter from London, June 14.
 "We are particularly happy on hearing it reported last night, that an accommodation was likely to take place between a Great Personage and the Prince of Wales."

As his Majesty's most gracious speech at the rising of the British Parliament on Tuesday last, speaks nothing of the negotiations going forward in Paris between Mr. Eden and the French Ministry, we have good reason to presume that the articles published about ten days ago in the London Newspapers, as the basis, or preliminaries of a commercial treaty between the two nations, were not grounded on any other authority, than the vague surmises, or idle imaginations of speculative writers.

Yesterday the Tickets were cut off into the Wheels A and B, at the Government Lottery Office in Crampton Court, preparatory to the Drawing of the State Lottery, which will commence on Monday the 7th of August next, and will continue for twenty-eight days—the scheme contains above one hundred capital prizes, and is one of the best ever set on foot in this kingdom.

Last Sunday evening the Queen of France was safely delivered of a Princess, which was named Sophia.

Lady Percy, Lord Bute's eldest daughter, is arrived from America, where she has resided for some time.

We hear that at the great wool-fair at Mullingar, which ended last Friday, there was a great demand, not a bag remained unfold.—Current price from fourteen shillings to fourteen shillings and nine pence per stone.

A gentleman found guilty at the last assizes of Roscommon, for forcing the possession of some lands, and sentenced for execution on the 25th ult. in consequence thereof, but respited to the 25th inst. has been graciously pardoned on giving security for future obedience to the laws.

A Privy Council it is said will be held on Monday next, in consequence of recent advices from Ulster.

A third West Indiaman has entered our harbour, and four more are expected within a fortnight, from which circumstance we may presume to declare that notwithstanding the illiberal restrictions with which a partial explanation of the navigation laws has coerced Ireland, the industry of our merchants may at last prevail in such a degree, as to force at least some trade from the West Indies directly.

We are confidently informed that a Member of the first consequence in our House of Commons is determined to bring in a bill at an early period of the session, for laying a tax of two shillings in the pound on the estates of all absentees; which, if passed into a law, will produce the sum annually of 140,000l. This if properly applied, may be a great means of alleviating part of the public burdens.

We are informed that a gentleman of the first style in the fashionable world, has forfeited two thousand guineas, for not performing a voyage to the East Indies, which he had undertaken some time ago, for a very considerable sum.

Much has been said, much has been written, on the subject of the Hasting's diamond.—If the story, as told, is true, is certainly come to hand, at a most unlucky period.—If otherwise, and a present, of such immense value, was conveyed to the King, in order to bias him in the administration of executive justice, it was the most daring, unparalleled, and flagrant attempt that ever blazoned the annals of Asiatic corruption.

A gentleman arrived from the county of Carlow, gives the melancholy account of four men being stifled in one of the coal pits, by a sudden hot exhalation which issued from a new vein they had opened. The effects of this vapour were so strong as to be sensibly felt by several persons who stood near the brink of the pit, but the dizziness and difficulty of breathing passed off in a few seconds, as they were fortunately in the clear air.

On Monday was married, at St. James's church, Capt. Leo, of the Royal Irish Volunteers, to Miss Letitia Davies, of Llanwich, in the county of Denbigh, North Wales.

Tralee, July 17. A few days ago, as Mr. Edward Eagar, of Listry, in this county, was attempting to execute a decree on one Foulue, the latter suspecting his intent, and being armed with a loaded Firelock, discharged it at the former on his approach, and lodged the contents in his head, of which he instantly expired.

The White Boys still persist in their meetings, both by night and day; no part of the county is free from them, except just in the neighbourhood of this town. They meet without any sort of offensive weapons, and merely, as they say, to redress the oppressions of the poor with

We are happy to find that only two men, O'Brien of Newcastle, and Murphy of Drumcoloher, were killed last Sunday evening near Rathkeal, and that the prudent measures taken by the Mayor and Recorder of Limerick, and John Brown, of Mount Brown, Esq; are likely to be attended with the most salutary effects. The peasantry of Munster are determined to wait peaceably until some able senator shall convince the Parliament that this useful body of men have been oppressed by heavy and unequal taxes, operating at once to the discouragement of agriculture and population, which form the strength of every kingdom. No doubt but the enemies of Ireland are glad of an opportunity to traduce our national character, but it is very evident from the whole conduct of these ignorant men, that they never harboured any thing hostile to government. Their loyalty to King George III. has been often proved in fighting his battles, and their gratitude to government has been often expressed, for giving them liberty of religious worship, and to take long leases; what remains to make their lives in some small degree comfortable, we hope will be effected by a PATRIOT KING, and a wise and good government.

Wednesday the second of August next, is appointed by the Lord Bishop of Limerick, for his ordinary Visitation for the Diocese of Limerick.

Since the institution of the Limerick Society in favour of poor insolvent Debtors, the Rev. Deane Hoare, by the payment of 235l. 2s. 5½d. enlarged 99 persons, whose debts amounted to 783l. 9s. 6½d. by which, such a number of poor persons were not only restored to their families, and to the Public, but were exonerated from the balance of 534l. 16s. 7½d.—By a further small aid from the Public, and a charitable Disposition in the Creditors, he should hope to enlarge 9 more; which would leave only 5 persons in confinement, whose debts (amounting to upwards of 400l.) are too large to be attempted to be compounded.

Last Thursday evening a new born female infant was taken up drowned near the New Bridge.
