## COUNTRY NEWS.

Waterford, Aug. 11. Last Sunday the White Boys assembled at Carrick, and swore several people in and about that town.

Last Tuesday there was a numerous and respectable meeting of the nobility, gentry, clergy, and freeholders of the county of Waterford, at Dungarvan, convened by Sir Richard Mulgrave, Sheriff; when they unanimously came to several spirited resolutions for the suppression of tumultuous risings and proceedings of those infatuated people called White Boys.

Last Tuesday died in Factory lane, the relict of John Edgworth, Esq; formerly one of the land-waiters of this port.

The paragraph inserted in our last which mentioned the death of Capt. John Burn, proves to be premature.

Clonmel, August 10. A friend to humanity, who lately observed a number of decent tradesmen, unemployed in this town, was induced to enquire to what cause their want of employment was owing, he found them to be journeymen combers, whom their employers had disbanded; and, on applying to the masters, he was given to understand, that the extraordinary advance in the price of wool had rendered it impossible for them to continue the business without a certain and considerable loss;—to support this assertion, the masters assured him that they had on hand worsted to the amount of many thousand pounds which they could not vend, at a price that would bear any proportion to that which the raw material sells for at present.

On further enquiry he found that no less a number, than eighty combers have been lately turned out of work, who, if fully employed, would in the course of twelve months, work up the produce of twenty five thousand stones of fleece wool; the labour of manufacturing which would amount to eight thousand pounds—

These circumstances he was assured were, (and believe to be) facts, and also that if the present high prices of wool continue, there must necessarily be many more tradesmen put away.

He submits it to the consideration of the gentlemen of the town and neighbourhood of Clonmel, whether it be not well worth their attention to strike out some employment for the many hands which were employed in this useful branch of business, who are now idle, and consequently in want. The town must be materially interested in such a measure; the decay of trade in any place soon becomes visible in the decline of the place itself, and Clonmel must certainly feel the effects of the present want of that business, if something be not done to remedy the evil.

We hear from Allouis, in the county of Clare, that a man named Paul O'Brien died lately here, aged 107 years five months. This patriarch of the western peasantry, as he might be called, exercised the trade of a cooper, in which employment, he rambled all over the country, until within a few days before his death.

It is much to be lamented, that after all the exertions of the Mayor, to have the inhabitants supplied with pure and wholesome bread, there is still a great quantity of muddy bread manufactured in town, which the Mayor has given strict orders to be seized and given to the poor.

A few days ago, Mr. William Alps, was admitted one of the Procurators General of the Bishop's Court, of the Diocese of Limerick.

Last Thursday our Races ended, which afforded excellent sport, the Hunter's plate was won by Mr. Ormsby, beating four others.
