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Extract of a letter from Clonmel, August 27.

" The White Boys have been handled this day by the army in a manner they did not exped. Early this morning they were affembling at Rolegreen, about two miles from Cashel, in order to go to Cashel, to impose their unlawful oaths on the inhabitants. Their intention being known, it was determined they should be opposed on their first assembling. Accordingly a Mr. Hare a minister and magistrate of that city, called out the army, about 30 in number, repaired to the place they were affembling at, and found from a to 500 of them collected .-What passed between the parties on their meeting I have not learned, but the army were foon ordered to fire, and three of the White Boys were killed on the spot, and feveral wounded; on the first fire they dispersed."

Last Sunday eighteen of the Right Boys were apprehended in Thomastown, by Lord Clifden and Mr. Langrishe, assisted by a party of light horse, and committed to Kilkenny gaol, efcorted by a detachment of the 4th horfe.

Same day a confiderable number of the right Boys were affembled in the barony of Ida, in the county of Kilkenny, and fwore the inhabi-

Cork, Aug. 28. Friday morning last about 2 o'Clock, nine men on horseback, difguifed only by flouched hats, came to the houle of Mr. Thomas Donovan, Tythe Proctor, of Rockhill, midway between Blarney and Mallow, who being in bed made him arise on pretence of going with him to his brother, who is also a Tythe Proctor, to adjust some difference relative to their mode of agreement for Tythes, when after their arrival there and intending to take his brother also with them, which they would probably have done, were it not that they had humanity enough to defift from their purpole, on account of his wife's being in child bed; but they took faid Thomas en a horse and conveyed him near the Chapel of Blarney, and there plunged him into a hole provided for the horrid purpose and buried him up to chin, where he remained until 10 o'clock, being about fix hours, threatening death and destruction to any person who thould liberate him before 12 o'clock that day; but by the resolution and public spirit of Mr. Charles Sullivan, of Blarney-lane, he refolutely without any affiltants freed bim from his horrid imprisonment and conveyed him safe to his house.

We hear from Mallow, that on Friday laft the Mallow Independent Volunteers, commanded by Col. John Longfield, having had private information that the White Boys intended to attack fome individuals in that town, they immediately affembled, and have fince kept up a regular guard. " Sunday, those deluded miscreants called White or Wrong Boys, affembled at Kilrush, in order to fwear the Inhabitants to pay no Tythes whatever, or Church rates; immediately after fervice, the Rev. Mr. Irwin Whitty found one of those sellows administering the oaths, upon which he immediately feized him, and with very great difficulty Mr. Whitty difperfed them, after detaining the person who had the impudence to fwear his Congregation; Mr. Samuel Jackson who was the Proctor or viewer of Mr. Whitty's tythes affilted him : but fuch was the inveterate rancour of thefe people, that they went that night in fearch of Mr. Jackson, and not finding him at home, they rented their malice on two fine mares of faid Jackfon's, and cut off their ears close to their heads .- We hear that Mr. Whitty has wrote to Government for a troop of Light Horse, to keep down these rebellious infurgents; too much praise cannot be given to Mr. Whitty for his exemplary conduct as a Clergyman and his activity as a Magistrate; -it were much to be wished, that the sleeping magistrates would awake, and follow fo laudable a pattern."
