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Clonmel, 31. Committed, to the County Jail, on the 28th inst. by the Right Hon. Earl of Tyrone, Thomas M'Grath and James Beckett, both of Carrick, and Mathew Beckett, of Carrickbeg, charged with having assembled in an illegal manner, on Monday the 14th inst. amongst a number of people, who call themselves Right Boys, and with having being principally active in administering oaths, and threatening the lives of such as refused to swear conformable to their regulations.

As a party of the light infantry of the First, or Royal regiment of foot, commanded by Lieut. Mannoeh, had taken the above prisoners in charge, in order to escort them to jail, assisted by John Cosgrave and Patrick Kennedy, constables, they were violently attacked in the streets of Carrick by a numerous mob, who pelted them with stones from the lanes and avenues so furiously that some of the army were very much hurt:—This treatment obliged them (for their own safety, and the more effectual security of the prisoners) to fire, though with reluctance, by which one of the mob was killed, and are informed more of them were wounded.

Last Sunday eighteen of the Right Boys were apprehended in Thomastown, county of Kilkenny, by Lord Clifden and Mr. Langrishe, assisted by a party of light horse, and committed to Kilkenny jail, escorted by a detachment of the 4th horse.

T R A L E E, August 31.

Monday last, the Revenue of Dingle received information, that a quantity of smuggled goods were secreted in the house of one Nelagan, of Lough, near the harbour's mouth, for which place the Officers immediately set off, where they arrived about three o'clock in the afternoon, and made a seizure of fourteen kegs of brandy and seven bags of leaf tobacco. About 11 o'clock the same night, between 2 and three hundred men, supposed to be Right Boys armed with fire and side arms, attacked the house, into which they fired several shot, when an action commenced, which was spiritedly supported by the Revenue for a considerable time, until their ammunition was expended, and the house in flames whereupon the seizure was re-taken, and the Revenue most unmercifully treated.

Yesterday a letter arrived in town from Listowhill, requesting a reinforcement of the military, the Right Boys having threatened to set fire to the town on the following night—We have not yet heard whether they attempted putting their threats into execution.

The fellow who conveyed this paper to the Priest was taken prisoner that night by Charles Massey, of Griston, Esq; and was soon after escorted by him...
