

To the Right Hon. Lord Viscount LUT-
TREL, Commanding his Majesty's Troops

"WE, the Inhabitants of the Parish of
Lisboney, beg leave to Address your Lordship,
and to express our unfeigned happiness at the
wise choice our amiable Chief Governor has
made, in selecting your Lordship to enquire
into the Causes of our Distress, and Voluntary
Associations, to remove in a peaceable manner
(a manner we trust not repugnant to the Laws)
the Grievances we complain of.

"In your Lordship's humanity, we are sure
of a warm and deservedly powerful Advocate,
in your Lordship's candour, of a just and
respectable evidence of the integrity and
purity of our Intentions.

"We need not produce to your Lordship,
particular instances of the Oppression the Poor
of this Kingdom labour under, being confident
that many must ere this have distressed your
Lordship's feelings, and we should be extremely
wanting in humanity and justice, not to
co-incide in Sentiment, and co-operate in a
quiet and modest Perseverance with our Neigh-
bours and Countrymen, in guarding against
those Exactions which the Catholic Clergy, a
too numerous Body, and the accumulated
Frauds, Extortions, and Illegal Oppressions of
the Poor, by Tythe-Proctors and Jobbers,
who backed by the Partial Authority of a
Court, banished most Countries in Europe,
have made useful to the destruction of Agri-
culture and obvious cause of Emigration in the
Natives.

"Your Lordship's discernment will perceive
our Demeanor peaceable as our Views; our
Attachment to our justly beloved Sovereign,
to our deservedly admired Constitution, great
as Loyalty can display, or Gratitude lay
claim to.

"Your Lordship's knowledge of Mankind,
is we are confident too great to suffer you to
be misled by the misrepresentations of our
Enemies: The Instruments of Extortion, we
have already pointed to your Lordship, the
view with a jaundiced Eye, every step however
innocent in intention, and peaceable in its
conduct, which threatens to deprive them of
their Gain; or strike the Axe at the Root of
their Oppression. They my Lord have an
Interest in Slander and too Contemptible them-
selves to dissolve Associations recommended by
Policy and cemented by Compassion, would
blacken us with that Government we would
cheerfully Defend at the Hazard of all that
is Dear."

Forces in the Province of Munster.

My Lord,

WE his Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal
Subjects, the High Sheriff and Magistrates
of the County of Limerick, beg leave to congrat-
ulate your Lordship on your arrival in the City
of Limerick, your coming here evinces the atten-
tion of Government to the state of this Country;
and we rejoice that for the short time you have
been in Munster, your Lordship has been so suc-
cessful in bringing numbers of these deluded
People called WHITE-BOYS, to a proper sense
of their Duty, who for a length of time have
violated the Laws of this Kingdom.

We beg leave to assure your Lordship, that
we feel much for the delusion those unfortunate
People have been led into, by taking unconsti-
tutional Oaths, which in their nature cannot be
binding.—And we make this Publick declara-
tion, that if those Insurgents should attend to
such Oaths, and not immediately become subser-
vient to the established Laws of this Kingdom
and wait the wisdom of Parliament, for a redress
of any Grievances that may exist, we will exert
every Power the Law has given us; and we hope
with your Lordship's assistance to bring those
Violators of the Publick Peace to condign punish-
ment.
