

Bridget Geary, for wilfully drowning a child in the river Blackwater, belonging to a beggar woman, to be hanged on the 31st of October next.

William Connor, a Right Boy, to be publicly whipped thro' Carrick-beg on Saturday the 16th of September, and on Saturday the 9th of December next, and to be imprisoned for six months.

James Wall, a Right Boy, to be imprisoned for three months.

William Loughnane, for felony, to be publicly whipped through the town of Tallow on Saturday the 23d of September instant, and to give security to keep the peace for two years.

Mary Connor, to be burned in the hand, Stephen Cahill, to be burned in the hand, imprisoned for three months, and to give security to keep the peace for two years.

Richard Butler, to be publicly whipped through the town of Lismore on Saturday the 30th of September, and Saturday the 7th of October next, to stand in the pillory for one hour on each of said days immediately after being whipped, and to give security to keep the peace for two years.

Early last Saturday morning, William Connor was escorted by a party of the army from our county gaol, to Carrick-beg, where he was publicly whipped, pursuant to his sentence at the last assizes, for associating with those deluded people called Right Boys.

Same night he was brought back and lodged in gaol.

T R A L E E, September 18.

Those nine days past a man, named Timothy Connor, had been confined as a Right-Boy at Killarney, the weather being during that time so extremely wet as to prevent his being transmitted to gaol, till yesterday morning, when a troop of the 13th light dragoons quartered there, under the direction of the Rev Arthur Herbert, set off for this town with their prisoner. On their way Mr. Herbert received information, that some principals of those misguided people were then at the chapel of Pieries, a small distance off the road, and having surrounded it, he took Peter Daly, James Savage, and Timothy Casey, against whom, we hear positive informations are given.—On searching Daly, a sword was found concealed under his coat, and in his pocket a list of the names of many of these people, among whom was his own, styling himself Captain Right, and that of Savage as one of his Serjeants.—They were all safely lodged, yesterday evening, in our gaol.

L I M E R I C K.

Col. Herbert of Muckrus, and Mr. Pelham, Surveyor, returned this week from a journey to the head of the River Shannon; they travelled by water wherever it was practicable, and slept every night in a tent or marquee. They have taken several views of the islands, abbeys, castles, round towers, bridges, &c. on the Shannon, which it is hoped will be one day given to the Public. The gentry of Ireland need not travel to the Continent to explore natural curiosities: there are great numbers in Ireland, many of which are neglected and unknown.

The Hon. Mr. Justice Toler, who is joined in the commission with the Right Hon. Chief Baron, and the Hon. Justice Henn, opened the County Court on Tuesday morning last, and in a speech of fifty minutes, gave an excellent Charge to the Grand Jury on the present disturbances in this Province, and on their duty in general.—In the course of the above Charge, the Judge, after investigating minutely the Common and Statute Law under a variety of Acts of Parliament, as applicable to the present Crisis, he took much pains to

interrupt, when the defendant seized his goods in execution; the trial lasted from three o'Clock yesterday until three o'Clock this morning—Council for the plaintiffs Messrs. Dickson, Emmett, Rumbold and Lyfaght. For the defendant Messrs. Ducary, Smyth, Sankey, Egan, Dwyer, and Power.—Agent, for the Plaintiffs, Mr. Rose;—for the Defendant Messrs. Dwyer, Holland, and Meredith.—The Jury having first brought a different verdict, the matter we hear will be argued before the Lord Chancellor.

Yesterday in the city court Elizabeth Ryan, alias Dwyer was capitally convicted for stealing a parcel of wearing Apparel &c. out of the house of Thomas Jackson esq;—also Bridget Ryan alias blind Biddy for robbing a man of twenty guineas near Groody turnpike—James Littleton for robbing Mr. Molony chandler of a quantity of soap, was also found guilty; Cooney alias Dunby Cooney, was presented as a vagabond

Yesterday evening General Masly, his Lady, family and suit, arrived at his Seat at Elm.

This morning — Hartnet, second Captain of the White Boys from near Abbeysal, was apprehended by Major Scanlan, in a house outside Thomond-Gate, after a long search, and lodged in Gaol.
