Yesterday afternoon Sir Samuel Bradstreet, and feveral of the Judges, returned to this city from the fummer affizes.

As the topic of the unfortunate Fitzgerald has revived, in confequence of the late opinion of Sir Samuel Braditreet, in the cafe of the King against Foy, at Ballinrobe affizes, we think it not improper to state shortly the facts,

as they stand.

At the affizes of Castlebar, Foy was tried with several others, for the actual murder of M'Donnell and Hipson, and acquitted. Another indictment was brought forward against him, for provoking, flirring up, and procuring the murder of the fame M'Donnell and A meeting, we hear, from very respectable Hipson. To this last he pleaded auterfois acquit, and the plea was allowed.

The two indictments were founded on the statute of 10 Hen. VII. chap. 20. by which it is enacted, that " if any person on persons of malice do provoke, flir up, or procure any other person or persons to flay or murder any of the King's fubjects, within this land of Ireland, be deemed traitor likewife as if it should extend to our faid Sovereign Lord's person, and to his Royal Majesty."

Upon this statute Lord Chief Baron Yelverton and Mr. Baron Power held, that the provoking, flirring up and procuring, was a diftinct subtlantive treason, and not derivative.

Sir Samuel Braditreet held, that the procuring is in the nature of an accessorial offence, and ought to be confidered upon the ground of principal and accessory, and on that ruled that the plea ought to be received.

As this great question is thus differed upon, there can be no doubt but a writ of error will be brought, that the law may be fettled.
