Fx'ract of a letter from Geneva, Oct. to.

"Mr. Bukell is now here to negociate a treaty with the Protestant cantons, on account of the States General of Holland, for the hire of troops in case of necessity. The term is to be for 14 years from the time of figning, but neither the number of men, nor the conditions, have yet transpired."
