

GIVE me leave to acquaint you that I have been in France, Flanders, and Holland, and found that this was the proper featon for transplanting the plants of Rape Seed that was lowed in the month of July or August last, about this time the farmer vifits his crop of Rape, and where he finds they are too thick fown he draws the plants, and puts them in another part of the field where they will have more room to grow; others will transplant this Rape into wheat fallow, about a foot difin this manner, will produce near double what is lowed otherwise, those who are strangers to this way of raising Rape Seed are requested to make trial.
