or a letter from Bellaft, "The spirit of outrage and tumult which has to long difgraced the Southern parts of this kingdom, has lately made its appearance here under the power and patronage of an ablentee landlord, who has introduced a mode of determining property hitherto unknown to us. The Chief Baron for a confiderable time palt has been embanking part of his estate in the county Down, nearly opposite our town, which you know is in the county of Antrun. This measure it feems gave offence to M. T. who takes the WHOLE WEIGHT of the little Lord's estate upon himself, and he, instead of reforting to our Court of Justice in behalf of his mafter, if he had any good reason to think the Lord's grant of lands in the county of Antrim, conveyed to him an estate in the county of Down, directed the Irish agent to collect all the ruffians in the country, who on a Sunday night, or before day light on Monday morning, affembled to the number of 300 and upwards, and all armed, on the Chief Baron's works, and headed by Mr. A, and the Earl's Engineer, demolished a most useful and valuable improvement that has effectually relitted the late florms and promiled to be a great advantage to the proprietor, and a most desirable convenience to this town, as the Chief Baron with that liberality that marks his conduct not only let the lands at a reatonable value, but gave Perserulties to every improving tenant."

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In the Court of Exchequer, on Monday last, Sir Frederick Flood, in moving the Court to let afide an arrest caused by the agent of an Ablentee Nobleman, was remarkably fevere on the practice of ABSENTEEISM. Irithmen, he faid, were of a candid, focial temper; but when relident abroad, they become lavage and merciles -- they lofe the good qualities of Irithmen-s-the generous heart---the humane and warm foul, at least, if a judgment could be formed from their conduct to their tenantry; and what other rule have we to judge by? His client had bitter experience of it from an Irish English resident nobleman; he had been the victim of the most severe oppression. A two edged Iword was speken of in Scripture, as a horrid weapon, but the unfortunate Irish Englith refident nobleman (he called him unfortunate, because the man who was lost to all love of his comutry, and was to far depraved, as to make its impoverishment his chief object, he could not in the eye of reason but think an unfortunate man) had used a five-edged sword against his client. He ferved him with an ejectment, and afterward got leave to decline bringing it to trial; he got a writ islued against him-had him arrested in consequence, imprisoned in Wexford gaol, and then served with another ejectment; when from his fituation, it was impossible he could attend the trial, All this did not do, he got a fecond writ against him for the same, in order to blast his credit, left he should obtain bail. This was four edges, and to crown all, and make the hith, he got a writ of covenant against him: After all, when his client had obtained his liberty, he again arrested him in the month of September laft, without any previous affidavit, (which was the ground of Sir-Frederick's motion) a chain of oppression to cruel, that he was fure no Irifhman -- no one but an Irifh English relident nobleman could be capable of linking together.
